Prince Charles' meeting with Gerry Adams

May 19, 2015

Prince Charles has met Gerry Adams, the President of a political party called Sinn Fein, as part of a hugely significant visit to Ireland.

It was the first meeting in the Republic of Ireland between a member of the Royal Family and Sinn Féin's leadership.

Why is it significant?

Back in the 1970s a huge battle raged in Northern Ireland. The fighting was about whether the country should be Irish or British.

On one side were the Irish Republican Army – known as the IRA. They thought

Northern Ireland should be part of the Republic of Ireland, and carried out deadly bomb attacks against police, politicians and ordinary people.

Gerry Adams is head of the political party – Sinn Fein – that was linked to the IRA

On the other side of the battle, groups loyal to Britain also carried attacks which killed innocent people.

More than 3,000 people died during the troubles, but in 1998 a peace deal was agreed.

Since then all sides have made steps to try and sort out the problems of the past.

Today is seen as very significant because Charles is Colonel-in-Chief of the Parachute Regiment, a part of the British Army.



The Parachute Regiment was involved in the killing of ordinary people in the city of Londonderry in 1972. And Prince Charles' great uncle Lord Mountbatten was killed by the IRA in 1979.

So this meeting is important because it shows the world how far people have come in trying to bring peace to Northern Ireland.

Young winner meets Queen

May 19, 2015

Thousands of people are expected to head to the Chelsea Flower Show in London this week.

It's one of the biggest and most prestigious flower shows in Britain.

Awards are given out in various categories, including Young School Gardener of the Year. This year's winner, 9 year old George, got the chance to meet the Queen.

Around 165,000 people are expected to visit the show over five days to enjoy the many gardens on display at the show which began in 1804.

Among the gardens being shown to special guests on Monday is one created for Sentebale.



The charity, Sentebale was created by Prince Harry and helps children living in poverty in Lesotho, Africa.



Horticulturalists have been working hard in the days leading up to the show's opening.

Is this the real face of William Shakespeare?



May 19, 2015

Shakespeare is one of the most famous playwrights in the world but despite this, no one really knows what he looked like.

A number of portraits claim to be of him but now a historian says he has uncovered the only portrait of Shakespeare made in his lifetime.

Mark Griffiths made the discovery in a 400-yearold book about plants, which was written in 1598.

Four unnamed figures appear in the book and he says plants the so called Shakespeare is holding, are code for the plays he had written.

The detail of Mark's discovery and the portrait of Shakespeare have been published in Country Life magazine.

However, Professor Michael Dobson, director of the Shakespeare Institute at the University of Birmingham, said he was "deeply unconvinced" by the theory.



Teacher's Tip

The page today focuses on trying to make children read literature carefully – slowly – so that they begin to see how the words, even by the way they are placed, can give a specific effect. It is a 'close reading', which will come in very useful when they begin to study literature seriously. Close reading teaches children to look at each word seriously, and study how significant it is in that particular piece of work. From the grammar aspect, it looks at the 'adverb', one of the word classes that go in to make a sentence.

Language Lesson

Adverbs

An adverb is a word that describes a verb. Adverbs are normally made by adding 'ly' to the adjective: gentle – gently/ tender – tenderly. They have been underlined in the poem.

Eg. While night comes on <u>gently</u>,
Night coming <u>tenderly</u>

But there can be exceptions as in: *To fling my arms wide*

The same word for adjective and adverbs

An adjective describes a noun. All the adjectives in the above poem have been given in bold. There are two important words that are the same in both these word classes: 'hard' and 'fast'.

Hard: Children don't like to eat <u>hard</u> bread. (Adjective)

He works very **hard**. (Adverb)

Fast: This is a <u>fast</u> car. (Adjective)
This car moves very <u>fast.</u> (Adverb)

Sometimes, the word changes completely as in good (adjective) – well (adverb).

A port city in South America, Asunción is the capital of Paraguay. Although the city is located within a landlocked country, it lies on the east bank of the Paraguay River, which widens to form a broad bay. The Pilcomayo River joins the Paraguay on the opposite shore.



Places of Interest

The avenues in Asunción are lined with orange and other flowering trees, and there are many plazas and gardens. Among the interesting buildings in the city are the cathedral, the presidential palace, and the Pantheon of Heroes, all built in the 19th century.



National Historical Museum

The modern Hotel Guaraní was designed by the Brazilian architect Oscar Niemeyer. The city's museums include the National Historical Museum as well as institutions devoted to archaeology and modern art.







Economy

Asunción processes and exports much of the food that is grown throughout the country. Cotton, sugarcane, corn (maize), tobacco, fruit and cattle products are processed in the city. Industrial plants produce textiles, vegetable oils, footwear and tobacco products.

The government employs many people in Asunción. Others work in service industries such as health care, tourism and trade.

History

The Guaraní Indians lived in the area that is now Asunción before the arrival of the Spanish in the 16th century. The city was named when a stockade, or wooden fort, was completed there by the Spanish on the Roman Catholic Feast of the Assumption (Asunción in Spanish) in 1537. Asunción was the most important Spanish colonial city in the eastern part of South America until Buenos Aires took over the role in the 17th century.

Paraguay declared its independence from Spain in 1811, and Asunción became the capital of the new republic. Brazil took control of the capital for almost a decade in the 19th century, but in 1876 Asunción again became the centre of government for Paraguay.

For much of the second half of the 20th century, the capital was home to a strict military ruler. As the century ended, new leaders were in place in Paraguay, but the economy worsened. Just outside Asunción, many shacks have been built to house the poor who work in the city and who farm its surrounding fields.

The human skeleton


The human skeleton consists chiefly of

- a) Skull
- b) Vertebral column (back bone)
- c) Girdles to which long bones of arms and legs are attached
- d) Bones of arms and legs.

Mandible is the jaw-bone.

Clavicle which is on the front side, and scapula which is found on the back part, together make up what is called the pectoral girdle. What is labelled as the pubis and ilium are parts of the pelvic girdle. The long bones of arms and legs are attached to these two girdles.

Phalanges, metacarpals and metatarsals are bones of fingers and toes.



- ☐ The skeleton provides protection and support for the internal organs of the head, chest and abdomen.
- □ It also functions as an intricate and sophisticated series of levers which are moved by the muscles (skeletal muscles) which are attached to the bones. These lever systems can be seen at the elbows, knees, wrists, ankles, fingers and toes.
- \Box It gives the body a definite shape.
- ☐ The bone marrow within the long bones, produce red blood cells and white blood cells.

The skeletal muscles act according to the commands given by the brain and move the bones to which they are attached, to perform all the actions of motion (like bending, running, sitting, grasping, standing etc.)

Long bones are tough due to the hard bone on the outside. They are also not heavy (lightweight) since the inside part of it is spongy. Blood vessels supply nutrients and oxygen, needed for the growth of bones.
