

## **Keystone Species**

'magine that everyone woke up one day, to find that all the nails in the world had mysteriously vanished overnight. Doors would have fallen off their hinges, paintings and furniture would have crashed onto the floor and even some structures would have collapsed - so much chaos and destruction because of something so small and seemingly insignificant.

While nails are unlikely to vanish overnight, species have been vanishing over the years and 1 million animal and plant species are now threatened with extinction.



Between 1970 and 2020, the population sizes of mammals, birds, fish, amphibians and reptiles have dropped by 68 percent, according to the Living Planet Index (which measures trends in thousands of wildlife populations across the globe).

Surely, the extinction of some animal or plant cannot have such a large impact? Well, they can. Species such as these, which are vital to (and have a disproportionately large effect on) their ecosystems, are called "keystone species". Zoologist and ecologist, Robert Paine, coined this term in 1969, after a study of starfish along the Pacific coastline. He observed that when the starfish were removed from the area as part of an experiment, the mussel population which they fed on, increased so much and congested the ecosystem that other species could not survive. This caused the biodiversity of the ecosystem to reduce drastically.

### Scientists have since then listed three types of keystone species:

#### **Predators**

They help keep the population of their prey in control, which in turn impacts the animals and plants down the food web. Similar to the starfish and mussels, sea otters protect kelp forests by controlling the population of sea urchins.

### **Ecosystem engineers**

These are organisms that create, change or destroy a habitat. Beavers, for example, shape river



ecosystems by redirecting water with their dams, creating wetlands where a variety of animals and plants thrive. Their use of old or dead trees for their dams further allows new, healthier trees to grow in their place liberally

Mangrove trees serve a similar function: their massive roots reduce erosion along shorelines, while also providing safety for small fish and mitigating the impact of tsunamis on land.

### **Mutualists**

This is when two or more species interact for each other's (and the ecosystem's) benefit. Bees and flowers are the best example here. In the process of collecting nectar and pollen (their primary food sources) from flowers, bees also spread pollen on to other flowers, increasing the



chances of fertilisation, flower and fruit growth.

While some scientists have criticised this idea for oversimplifying complex ecological systems, the bottom line is that even the most unassuming organism is needed for ecosystems and those dependent on them (humans included) to thrive.

Even if it is not a keystone species, the removal of one species could, with time, cause the ecosystem to collapse like a house of cards.

The Snake hissed louder. "You are the one who should leave," he said, his eyes burning with rage, "you are stupid and look like a dried up husk!"



"Not really," said the Mongoose, "his appearance is none of my business, but I still don't like how he looks!"


"I also get annoyed when I see him!" said the Snake.




