## That all important - Water

All of us are quite familiar with water. Most of us take it for granted and do not even care about it, which is bad. We cannot live without water.

As you know, at room temperature, water is a colourless, odourless, transparent liquid which can flow freely. It is one of the most common liquids, being the main constituent of the earth's hydrosphere. It is vital for all known forms of life, even though it provides no calories or organic nutrients. Body fluids of practically all living organisms are made up of water.

Water is a substance composed of the chemical elements hydrogen and oxygen and has the formula  $H_2O$ . Depending on the temperature, it can exist as solid (ice), liquid (normal water) or gas (steam or water vapour). It has the ability to dissolve many substances like salt, sugar, certain paints etc.

Without water in our bodies, we cannot survive. This wonderful liquid is involved in almost every body function – from digestion and circulation through to the control of body temperature and excretion of metabolic waste as urine.



The water in our bodies is continually being used by the body cells, or is lost from the body as sweat, urine etc.

As you know, we cannot cook, bathe, wash or do any real cleaning without water. Our main sources of this liquid for drinking, washing, agriculture and most industries are surface water, ground water and collected rain water. All of these are dependent on rain and snow falling on the earth's surface.

Where do we find this wonderful liquid? The answer is in the lakes, seas, oceans, waterfalls, rivers and streams. Do you know that one quality of water saves the lives of aquatic creatures during very cold seasons? At temperatures below the freezing point of water, ice is formed in rivers, seas etc. But the density of ice is lower than that of liquid water, and water is most dense at 4°C. So, when the surface water cools, it gets dense and goes down and the warmer water comes up and gets cooled. This goes on till all the water is at 4°C. Any more cooling will result in ice forming only at the surface. So, aquatic animals can live at the bottom in the liquid water.

Precipitation is any form of water that falls from clouds in the sky. It may be rain (liquid) if warm, or it may be frozen (ice) if very cold. But most of us get our supply of this liquid directly from the tap.

Do you know that although water covers about 70% of the earth's surface, it is actually a rare substance that represents about 0.05% of the total mass.

Why so rare? Because most of it is trapped in glaciers, or in the very depths under the bedrock and hence, cannot be easily obtained in large quantities as and when required.

So remember, clean water is a very precious commodity and is not a thing to be wasted!

## **The Diamond-Water Paradox**

The general notion is that the higher the value of something is, the higher its price must be. Why then is the price of water only a tiny fraction of that of a diamond? Humans cannot survive for more than three days without water, but can live a lifetime without ever needing a diamond.

This strange contradiction is what's known as the diamondwater paradox or paradox of value. Over the centuries, there have been a great many explanations, but the most widely accepted and recent one is that the value of any object is subjective (based on or influenced by personal feelings, tastes or opinions) and dependent on the availability of that object.

If, for example, a person who has been lost in the desert for days, without anything to drink, is offered the choice between a bottle of water and a diamond, they will undoubtedly choose the water. If the offer is repeated, they will keep choosing the water, until their thirst is quenched, and begin choosing the diamond from then onwards. After each drink of water, the dehydrated person will value



the next one even less, until they might simply feel nauseous at the thought of even drinking anymore.

In economics, this is known as the law of diminishing marginal utility – with every extra unit gained, the lesser the increase in satisfaction (or, in economic terms, utility) a person gets from it.

Since most people on the planet have access to water, while diamonds are not as easy to come across, the latter is valued more. A similar case is the historical value of gold and aluminium: before the 1890s, the price of aluminium exceeded that of gold, because it was difficult to refine, and therefore, very rare. Once the process for industrial smelting was developed and

aluminium was mass-produced, the price fell and it was used widely for everyday items. Therefore, the value of things is defined more by its rarity, than its usefulness.

This theory applies to not only the value of goods, but the more intangible aspects of life as well (such as education, jobs and relationships).

The frequent use of the phrase 'take for granted' is proof, for example, that people often under-value what they have or can easily have, while overvaluing what they do not have or would be difficult to have.
