



Maths in Action 55 By R. N. A. de Silva

Google Translate is a multilingual translation service developed by Google to translate text from one language to another. It supports



over 100 languages at various levels. It was launched in 2006 initially translating text word by word. In 2016, the process was enhanced to enable translation of whole sentences.

If you are learning another language, you would have started with basic vocabulary and grammatical rules thereby learning how to construct sentences. Google Translate takes a different approach. It lets the computers discover the rules themselves by analyzing millions of documents that have already been translated by human translators. These translated texts can be books, United Nations documents and transcripts and websites from all around the world.

In this way, Google's language translation program uses statistics to compare documents written in the first language with documents written in the second language. The computers scan the texts looking for statistically significant patterns and use them to translate similar texts.

This process which does not rely on the knowledge of definitions or grammar is called 'Statistical Machine Translation'. It relies on probabilities as to the chance of converting a sentence

in the first language correctly into another language. The probability is enhanced with the increased scanning of texts. There can be errors in the translation as the probability may not be one with the translation between any two languages. Statistical machine

translation has roots in information theory, a branch of applied mathematics dealing with signal processing and data compression.

When you use Google Translate

next, be appreciative of the mathematical developments which made this possible.





Let's begin...








