Indigenous Peoples

Indigenous People are generally known as the descendants of the inhabitants of a country or geographical region at the time people of different cultures or ethnic origins arrived and eventually dominated the area.

Even though they are spread across over 90 countries, the global population of over 370 million Indigenous Peoples often face common issues, such as:


- Lack of formal recognition of their rights over their lands, territories and natural resources. Due to this, their lands are often taken for development projects, farmlands or the extraction of natural resources.
- Lack of political representation and participation in decisions that affect them.
- Discrimination and difficulty in participating in the formal economy.
- Lack of access to justice, education and other social services.

In addition, the COVID-19 pandemic has made their lack of access to health, water and sanitation services more serious, as well as impacted their livelihoods and food security due to restrictions on mobility and the closure of markets.

Many Indigenous Peoples still live as their ancestors did to this day, mainly as hunter-gatherers, who lead simple lives in harmony with nature. However, with time, their traditions and culture are slowly fading, due to merging with modern society, following the advent of urbanization.

Despite making up less than 5% of the global population, Indigenous Peoples are responsible for protecting 80% of Earth's remaining biodiversity.




