# **Tokyo 2020 Paralympic Games**



The Summer Paralympics is a major international multi-sport event for athletes with disabilities, governed by the International Paralympic Committee. The Tokyo 2020 Paralympic Games is scheduled to be held from August 24 to September 5, 2021.

Sri Lanka's Paralympians made their debut in the 1996 Paralympics in Atlanta. Since then they have made giant strides,

winning two Bronze medals through athletes Pradeep Sanjaya who won Bronze in the men's 400 m in London 2012 and Dinesh Priyantha Herath who won Bronze in the men's javelin throw in Rio 2016.

The Sri Lankan team for Tokyo 2020 Paralympics comprises six athletes, an archer, a wheelchair tennis player and a rower, as Sri Lanka has qualified for a rowing event for the very first time in its Paralympics history.

# **Dinesh Priyantha Herath**



### Javelin

Team captain Dinesh will aim to convert his bronze into a gold at Tokyo 2020. A two-time silver medallist in the Javelin (F46 category) at the World Para Athletics Championship, he will spearhead Sri Lanka's historic quest for that elusive gold. A former soldier, Herath (35 years) is determined to win in style by setting a world record.

#### **Archery**

Archer Sampath Bandara also returns as a two-time Paralympian having taken part in Rio 2016. Bandara, who lost his left leg below the knee in 2009 after stepping on an anti-personnel mine, has a world ranking of 34 in Recurve Men. He won Gold in the 2019 Asian Archery Championship in Bangkok.

### Chaminda Sampath Hettiarachchi

#### **Javelin**

Making his second appearance in the Paralympics, Sampath will take part in the men's Javelin (F64). He was a silver medallist at the 2018 Para Asian Games in Jakarta, Indonesia. Hettiarachchi is determined to make his presence felt at the Paralympics, having thrown a Personal Best of 62.11 m representing the Sri Lanka Army at the National Para Athletic Championship.

## Saman Maduranga Subasinghe



#### Men's 400 m Able seaman Saman Subasinghe who lost his left wrist following a

grenade blast in 2008. is in fine form for the men's 400 m (T46), after winning a silver at the Fazza Grand Prix in Dubai.

### **Mahesh Priyamal Jayakody**

#### Rowing

A Staff Sergeant in the Army Special Forces Unit, Mahesh Javakody is a paraplegic who was injured in the battle front. He will be rowing

for glory in the PR1 Men 1X Single Sculls. Jayakody won a silver medal in the 2019 Asian Para Championships in Bangkok.

What's happening in Afghanistan?

People in Afghanistan are waking up to a new leadership after the country's government collapsed and a military group called the Taliban took control of the capital city of Kabul.

Afghanistan is a country in South Central Asia that has been caught in war and fighting for decades.

The Taliban is a military group that have been fighting for power in the country.

Lots of people are concerned about what this takeover by the Taliban could mean both for people in Afghanistan and in other parts of the world.

The UK is to introduce a new resettlement scheme for Afghan refugees, aimed at helping those most in need to come to the UK.

UN Secretary–General António Guterres has asked the international community not to abandon the people of Afghanistan.

The UK government said it would soon release more details about its plans, but they would include help for women and girls.

The steps come after the Taliban seized control of Afghanistan's capital city Kabul,

prompting thousands to try to flee. More than 60 countries have published a statement calling for the Taliban to allow foreign nationals and Afghans to leave, and keep border crossings, roads, and airports open.

# Why chocolate supplies could be threatened if we don't help insects

hocolate supplies could run out if we don't save the bees and butterflies that help their production, new research has found.

Scientists from the University of Cambridge discovered that a decline in the number of insects like bees, butterflies, midges and wasps could mean that not enough cocoa plants grow.

And it's not just chocolate that might disappear! Scientists say that up to two thirds of the world's food production could be impacted.

They say supplies of apples, strawberries, soybeans and coffee may all go down. Why do we need insects to grow plants?

Chocolate is made from the beans of a cocoa tree.

Cocoa trees are only able to grow with the help of insects, in particular a type of midge called a Forcipomyia.

They help do something called pollination.

Why are these insects disappearing? Insects like midges and bees are declining.

This is because of climate change, pesticides and the destruction of their homes, or habitats.



Cocoa beans like these are the key ingredient in chocolate.

If we don't protect these insects, our chocolate supply might be impacted seriously in the next 20 to 50 years. But it's hoped that with people becoming aware of how important insects are, there is something that can be done to grow their numbers again.

# Giant Chinese dino species 'as big as a blue whale'

Two new species of massive dinosaurs – almost as big as blue whales – have been discovered in China.

Scientists from the Chinese Academy of Sciences say the previously unknown species may have lived about 120 to 130 million years ago and belong to the sauropod family. Sauropods were grass-eating dinosaurs with big bodies, long necks, small heads and large tails.

The research, published in the scientific journal Scientific Reports, is based on studies of fossils found in

China's northwest regions – in Xinjiang and the Turpan–Hami Basin – which increases the range of dinosaurs found in Asia.

The dinos have been named Silutitan sinensis – "silu" meaning "Silk Road" in Mandarin – and Hamititan xinjiangensis, a nod to the region where it was found.

The Silutitan species, researchers estimated, could be more than 20 metres long and the Hamititan specimen may have been about 17 metres long, compared to

modern-day blue whales that grow to lengths of 23 – 30 metres.
