
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## **Tales from the School Days** (Under the Tamarind Tree)

Sometimes you may think that you are a failure, but in reality, you are not.


You probably know about Bill Gates.

achieve his success in just a day. He had so many challenges in his life, but he did not give up. Why? Because he believed in himself.


Just like you should too.

# **Amazing Mazes**




aze solving can be considered as the act of finding a route from start to finish given many options. In general, a maze is filled with dead ends. To qualify as a maze, a design must have choices in the pathway. If it has just one pathway that leads from the entrance to the target, it is called a 'labyrinth'. The difference between a labyrinth and a maze can be seen through the following diagram.


Thus, many maze solving algorithms are related to graph theory.

One such method is called the

One such method is called the Tremaux's algorithm. This was discovered by the French architect Pierre Tremaux. This is supposed to work with all mazes although it does not guarantee to find the shortest route. It works according to the following directions.

- As you walk down the maze, draw a line on the path.
- At a dead end, turn around and walk back the way you came.
- At a junction you've not seen before, take any new path.
- At junction you have been to before:
  - If you are on a new path, turn back the way you came.
  - If you are on a path you've marked before, take a new path if you can.
- Never go down a path already marked with two lines.
- When your path reaches a junction, you choose an exit.

The Swiss mathematician Leonhard Euler was the first to analyze mazes mathematically which ultimately led towards many significant contributions to a branch of mathematics known as topology. In doing so, he founded the field of graph theory. If you think of a maze in an abstract way, you can consider it as a path which at certain points changes direction. Such a point is called a 'node'.

A path connecting two nodes is called an 'edge'. Mathematicians draw sketches combining these nodes and edges which could easily lead to the successful path that should be taken.

## Paralympic Games opening ceremony

spectacular opening ceremony has marked the start of the Tokyo 2020 Paralympic Games. Fireworks blasted into the night from the Olympic Stadium in Tokyo, Japan, where competitors will take part in many of the track and field events.

The Paralympics feature athletes with disabilities competing in 539 events, across 22 different sports.

The Paralympics have always been in the same year as the summer Olympics. The name comes from the word Parallel Olympics, (which means running alongside) and was shortened to Paralympics.

Just like the Olympics, these Games were supposed to take place a year ago in Japan, but were delayed due to the COVID -19 pandemic.



## Was the Tyrannosaurus rex a picky eater?

The Tyrannosaurus rex is known to have been one of the most terrifying dinosaurs to have walked the Earth.

Standing at up to four metres tall with a huge body and razor sharp teeth, there's no doubt the prehistoric animal was a powerful force to be reckoned

Now, a new study suggests the predators may have been even scarier than first believed.

But it may also have been choosy about what it actually ate,

Scientists studying the dinosaurs at the Institute of Dinosaur Research at Fukui Prefectural University in Japan say the nerves in parts of the jaw of the Tyrannosaurus rex may have recognised small differences in the texture and movement of their prey.

This suggests the dinosaurs would have been able to recognise different parts of the animals they consumed and this would have led them to choose what they ate and to eat each part differently, rather than just gobbling everything up at once.

The team used what's known as computed tomography to reconstruct and analyse part of a Tyrannosaurus rex's jaw which was originally found in Hell Creek Formation, Montana.

They compared their reconstruction to other dinosaurs such as Triceratops, as well as living crocodiles and birds and this allowed them to find out more

about the vessels and nerves in the lower jaw of the Tyrannosaurus rex.

The study revealed the distribution of nerves in the dinosaur's jaw would have allowed them to detect the best bits of their prey, similar to how humans can find out which foods they like the best through taste – and which ones they don't like so much!



# Spider-Man: No Way Home what's in the trailer?

The new trailer for the next Spider-Man film has dropped and it's packed with key info about the film.

'Spider-Man: No Way Home' is due out in the UK at Christmas

It will be the web slinger's third stand-alone film as part of the Marvel Cinematic Universe (MCU)



and it features some familiar faces as well as some blasts from the past.

So what's in there? Let's take a look.

At the end of the last film, Peter Parker had a shock as the world found out that he was Spider-Man.

Footage of his battle with

Mysterio was leaked online which made it look like Spidey was the bad guy. It also leaked his real identity to the world.

In the new trailer Peter seems to be dealing with the fallout from that.

## Boy wins £10,000 with upcycling app idea

11-year-old Otto who has created an app that could help more people upcycle.

Upcycling is transforming unwanted products that you can't use anymore, into new things that you can use.


Otto is the winner of the BT Young Pioneer

Award and will get up to £10,000 in funding from experts to allow people all over the UK to use his app 'FrankEinstein'.




