


Tales from the School Days (Under the Tamarind Tree)

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

An Interview with a Retired Pilot

Captain Lalith Wijetunge is a former Sri Lanka Air Force (SLAF) pilot (1978 – 1988) who served Air Lanka for 17 years. He is a past Trinitian who hails from Kandy and served as Captain in both the Kingfisher (2007 – 2008) and Mihin (2009 – 2015) Airlines. Aircraft he flew include the Lockheed Tristar, Airbuses 340, 330, 320, 319 and 321. Here is a short interview on his lifetime career.

Q: What sparked your interest in aviation?

A: Growing up, I'd seen aircraft only in the sky but never been inside. One of my uncles had served in World War II as a navigator. This created somewhat of an interest. As things had changed I went in to fly but not as a navigator.

Q: Could you describe your most unforgettable flying experience?

A: I was in the Air Force during the * Vadamarachchi operation. The Palaly airfield was considered safer to land despite plenty of enemy fire. The right-hand side engine caught fire. The left-hand engine, though damaged, was partially working. We just managed to make it. The whole aircraft was damaged, except the ** flight deck where I was flying with my co-pilot!

Q: What was your highlight achievement?

A: Becoming a Captain.

Q: What was the most difficult decision you made as a pilot?

A: Flying the Airbus 340 out of London with a full load of fuel and passengers, there was a technical failure during the climb. This limited the flight level to 20,000 feet. We wouldn't reach Colombo alongside the excessive fuel combustion. I had to *** dump the fuel and land in London for repairs, regardless the cost, as no spares were available en-route.

Q: Have there been pitfalls in your way? Are you pleased with your career choice?

A: There were several pitfalls but nothing serious. Yes, I'm pleased!





Q: In your opinion, what defines a professional pilot?

A: Being a pilot trained to handle an Airliner – ability, expertise and dedication are everything.



Matterhorn

The Matterhorn is one of the most recognized peaks that make up the Alps. It straddles two countries, Switzerland and Italy. This mountain is the result of the collision of two pieces of the earth's crust, the African Plate and the European Plate.

It is also the tenth highest mountain in Switzerland at a height of 4,478 metres. The pyramid shaped colossus of a mountain, which is very difficult to climb, is said to be the most-photographed mountain in the world.

This mountain's name is German, where Matte means "meadow" and horn means "peak". In Italian, it is called Monte Cervino and in French, Mont Cervin. All four faces of the pyramidal-shaped mountain face the four cardinal directions East, West, North and South.

The Matterhorn is part of the Swiss Federal Inventory of Natural Monuments since 1983.

- In total, up to 150 climbers attempt the Matterhorn each day during summer.
- Around 3,000 people climb the Matterhorn every year.

It is estimated that over 500 alpinists have died on the Matterhorn since the first climb in 1865, making it one of the deadliest peaks in the world.

In 2015, the route of the first explorers to ever conquer the Swiss Matterhorn has been lit up to mark 150 years since their climb. Lamps have been positioned along the historic route taken by Edward Whymper and his roped team when they scaled the iconic mountain.



Space travel: When can I go to space? September 14

t's an exciting time for space travel and exploration. We've seen some pretty big missions this year, with Sir. Richard Branson's Virgin Galactic flight to the edge of space and former Amazon boss and billionaire Jeff Bezos' epic trip in the New Shepard rocket ship.

There are several upcoming missions on the horizon too, with SpaceX's Inspiration4 flight – which will be the very first all civilian mission to launch into orbit - due to take off later in September. The dearMoon project, which will see Japanese billionaire Yusaku Maezawa take eight people into space on an epic six-day tour, could take place as early as 2023. And a company called Space Perspective is offering six-hour long flights to space in a pressurised capsule for a cool £90,000!

"The capsule is gently lifted into the air under a space balloon, powered by hydrogen gas, which is 18,000,000 cubic feet in volume when fully expanded as it reaches space," said Jane Poynter who is the founder and Co-CEO of Space Perspective. "This means if a football stadium could fly, it would be able to float around inside the fully inflated space balloon."

History of space travel

Human beings have been captivated by the idea of space for a long time and lots has been done over the years not only to get people there, but to also work out whether they can survive in space's unique conditions.

In October 1957, the Union of Soviet Socialist Republics (USSR) successfully launched the first artificial satellite, called Sputnik 1, into space during the Cold War. It marked the beginning of what became famously known as the 'space race', which was a contest between the United States of America and the Soviet Union to see which country could make the greatest advancements in the world of space exploration.

In November of that same year, the USSR successfully launched another spacecraft. It was called Sputnik 2 and this time, there was a very special guest on board – a dog

called Laika! The launch of Sputnik 2 was bad news for the Americans who were keen to catch up. They'd previously made two unsuccessful attempts to launch a satellite into space, but finally saw a breakthrough in January 1958

when they launched a rocket carrying a satellite called Explorer.

The National Aeronautics and Space Administration, which is more commonly known as NASA, was created later that year.

However, the Russians remained one step ahead. In April 1961, cosmonaut Yuri Gagarin became the first person ever to travel to space. American astronaut Alan Shepard

and in 1969, the US managed to successfully send the first astronauts

> to the Moon, with Neil Armstrong becoming the first human to set foot on its surface.

Fast forward to the present day and it is clear that advancements in space travel have come a very long way!

There are currently a number of astronauts and cosmonauts living on the International Space Station (ISS) which has been in orbit since 1998.

Last June, two NASA astronauts made history after they successfully made it to the ISS on a SpaceX rocket owned by billionaire businessman, Elon Musk.

There are also plans for NASA to send astronauts back to the Moon within the next decade, although it will no longer be as early as 2024 which was the original plan.
