# Reading Development Tips by Room to Read

9 years and below

Room to Read Sri Lanka is teaming up with Funday Times to bring another interesting series about reading development, to help parents/educators improve reading with comprehension among primary grade children and instill a habit of reading for life. This series will particularly feature tips about reading development alongside an illustration. The first lesson is about 'Shared Reading'.



Shared Reading is an interactive reading experience that occurs when students join in or share the reading of a book or other text while guided and supported by a teacher.

The teacher explicitly models the skills of proficient readers, including reading with fluency and expression.

The shared reading model often uses oversized books (referred to as big books) with enlarged print and illustrations.

### Why use shared reading?

- It provides struggling early readers with necessary support to read with ease.
- Shared reading of predictable text can build sight word knowledge and reading fluency.
- Allows children to enjoy materials that they may not be able to read on their own.
- Ensures that all students feel successful by exchanging thoughts and providing support to the entire group.

**Room to Read** is a global nonprofit organization that works on bringing quality education with the belief that, 'World Change Starts with Educated Children'. The organization seeks to transform the lives of millions of children in lowincome communities by focusing on literacy and gender equality in education.

### How to use shared reading

- Introduce the story by discussing the title, cover and author/illustrator. Ask children to make predictions regarding what they think the story might be
- Read the story aloud to the students using appropriate inflection and tone. Pause and ask the students to make predictions. Ask brief questions to determine students' comprehension level.
- Conclude the reading by reserving time for reactions and comments. Ask questions about the story and relate the story to the students' similar experiences. Ask the children to retell the story in their own words.
- Re-read the story and/or allow time for independent reading.
- Conduct follow-up activities such as making crafts, drawings related to the story.





# Thai Pongal Festival

Thai Pongal is a harvest festival to give thanks to the sun god for the harvest. In Sri Lanka, it is usually celebrated as a two-day festival. This year Thai Pongal was celebrated on January 14 and 15.

On the first day, a sweet rice meal (Pongal Rice) is made, dedicated to the sun god, and then consumed by families. The rice is boiled in milk, along with spices, raisins and cashews etc. Devotees visit the kovil with offerings.

On the second day of festivities (Mattu Pongal), the oxen who help farmers work their rice fields are honoured.
