Reading Development Tips by Room to Read



Phonological awareness is the foundation for learning to read. It's the ability to recognize and work with sounds in spoken language. This includes picking out words that rhyme, counting the number of syllables in a word and noticing sound repetition (Ex: Susie sold six salami sandwiches).

Phonological awareness involves skills like the 'phonemic awareness', which is about tuning in to individual sounds in a word, or phonemes. It lets children break apart a word into the sounds that make it up, and blend single sounds into words.

There are many ways to help children build phonological awareness such as by reading rhyming books, singing songs and asking children to come up with words that rhyme or that start with the same sound.




Gangaramaya Navam Maha Perahera





Reuleaux Triangle

Maths in Action 62 By R. N. A. de Silva

Task:

- 1. Draw an equilateral triangle, where all sides are of equal length.
- 2. Using a compass, draw a circle taking one of the vertices as the centre, passing through the other two vertices.
- 3. Repeat step 2 taking the other two vertices as centres.


The shaded area as shown in the first diagram above, is called the Reuleaux Triangle named after the 19th century German mathematician Franz Reuleaux.


It has many mathematical properties. The most important property is that it has a constant width. The distance between two opposite points is always the same, as shown in the next diagram.


This property has been used to manufacture drills that can cut square holes.



They can also be used as non-circular rollers.







It can be shown that the area of the Reuleaux triangle is $\frac{1}{2} (\pi - \sqrt{3}) r^2$ where r is the length of each side of the equilateral triangle.




Modern pencil designs have seen the adaptation of the Reuleaux Triangle. It enables a stronger grip.

This triangle has also been used as the shape for the cross-section of a fire hydrant valve nut. The constant width makes it difficult to open the fire hydrant with a standard wrench. It allows the fire hydrants to be opened only by firefighters with a special wrench.







Pulses

Pulses have been an important part of the human diet for centuries and still are, especially in countries like India, where a substantial percentage of the population are vegetarian.

What are pulses?

Pulses are the edible, dry seeds of leguminous plants (plants whose fruit is enclosed in a pod), such as lentils, chick peas and mung beans. Pulses do not include crops that are harvested green (such as green peas and green beans), crops used mainly for

oil extraction (such as soybean) and leguminous crops that are used exclusively to sow (such as the seeds of clover and alfalfa).



Why are pulses important?

Nutritional value

Pulses have loads of nutrients and are high in proteins, which make them a good source of protein in the absence of meat. They are low in fat and rich in soluble fiber, which can help reduce cholesterol levels and control blood sugar, making pulses useful in managing heart conditions and diseases like diabetes.

Pulses have also been found to help fight obesity.

Food security

Pulses are an important crop for farmers as they can be sold or consumed by the farmers themselves and can be stored for months without causing any loss in nutrition. In addition, pulses such as Pigeon peas and Bambara beans can be grown in poor-quality soil and tolerates drought.

Environmental benefits

Pulses have nitrogen-fixing properties that improve soil fertility which, in turn, increases the productivity of the farmland and reduces the need for synthetic fertilisers which are used to add nitrogen into the soil. Therefore, the greenhouse gases that are released during the manufacturing and use of these fertilisers are reduced as well. Farmers can also promote biodiversity in the farm as well as soil and keep harmful pests and diseases away, by using pulses for intercropping and crop cover.

February 10 was announced as World Pulses Day by the UN General Assembly in 2019 and 2016 was proclaimed as the International Year of Pulses to raise awareness of the nutritional and environmental benefits of pulses.

> Many countries in Western Africa, like Mali, have increased production of pulses, due to its potential to overcome issues such as climate change, desertification, water scarcity and malnutrition.



Pulses around the world

Also known as faba beans or broad beans, this crop is native to the Mediterranean and Central Asia, but has been cultivated around the world, from Peru to Australia, due to its high yield and tolerance of harsh, cold climates

The fava bean-based dish, Ful (or Foul Mudammas) is part of a typical breakfast in Egypt, Lebanon and Syria.



These sweet and nutty beans are used widely in Japan, Korea and China to make red bean paste, a popular filling for dumplings, steamed bread and sweet cakes as well as an ingredient in popular desserts such as Chinese mooncakes and the Eight-treasure rice pudding.

Navy beans

The navy bean is a variety of the common bean and has its roots in Central and South America. The white beans are used to make baked beans, which makes up part of a traditional English breakfast.
