Of all the animals on Earth, dogs are the only ones that have been honoured with the title of 'Man's Best Friend'. So, here is a glimpse into the world of our canine companions.

Canine Geneology

All dogs trace their origins to one species of wolf (now extinct and about which very little is known) and even though the appearances of modern dogs

have changed greatly, they have retained some old habits: before sitting down, dogs (from Labradors to mixed breeds) turn round and round in one spot (sometimes even paw and scratch at the area) regardless of where they are, because their ancestors would have to flatten grass or plants to make it into a comfortable bed.

Notable dogs

Laika - A mixed breed (mongrel) from the streets of Russia, who became the first animal to orbit the Earth in 1957.

Fido – A rescued street dog in Italy, who, for 2 years, would accompany his owner to the bus stop and return again at the end of the work day to greet him. His owner died during a World War II bombardment and never made it to the bus stop. Fido continued to wait for him every day, until he died 14 years later, near the bus stop.

Hachikō - A white Akita in Japan who would meet his owner at the Shibuya Train Station every day when he returned from work. His owner died suddenly at his workplace and Hachikō continued to wait for him every day at the train station, until his death over 9 years

Bosco - A black Labrador who beat human candidates to be elected as the Mayor of Sunol, California, USA.

From companion to commodity?

Owning a purebreed or cross-breed to some is seen as prestigious or a status symbol. In Sri Lanka, this has led to breeding turning into a business, where dogs are often treated poorly and cruelly neglected or abandoned on the streets once they can no longer provide puppies for the breeders to sell.

Similarly, people who buy these dogs simply to show them off, often end up neglecting them once the novelty of owning such a dog wears off. This results in mental health issues, such as anxiety and depression, and in worse cases, even physical health problems, which are sometimes fatal.

The non-profit organisation 'Tails of Freedom' rescues such dogs, nurses them back to health and finds them suitable homes once they are mentally and physically ready.



Domestication and Breeding

Dogs were domesticated by humans at different times in different regions over thousands of years. The reasons for domestication

varied and humans eventually began selectively breeding dogs for specific purposes.

In cold regions, breeds such as the Siberian Husky and Alaskan Malamute were bred to be sled dogs; Old English Sheepdogs and German Shepherds were bred to be herding dogs; and, Beagles and Dachshunds were bred to be hunting dogs. However, nowadays, dogs of various breeds are trained to sniff out everything from explosives to diseases such as cancer.

So-called violent breeds


There is a common misconception that certain breeds, such as the Pit Bull, Doberman Pinscher and Rottweiler, are violent, but in reality, the temperament of a dog largely depends on how it has been treated.

Therefore, a Pit Bull who has been treated

with kindness would likely be more affectionate than a Labrador who has been treated cruelly.








From a Young Reporter

The Physics to our colourful world

'Colour', the aspect that makes our everyday vibrant, is a way of perceiving life based on visible light. In the 1660s, the 'visible spectrum' was discovered by Isaac Newton using a prism. He showed that clear white light such as sunlight was composed of seven colours.




Our eyes' retina contains millions of rods and cones; light-sensitive cells that process light into nerve impulses which are sent to the brain to interpret colour. Additive colour is how we see colour by light itself and is created by blending coloured light. The primary additive colours, red, green and blue, produce white when combined equally and give the secondary colours when combined varyingly.



Additive colour combination

When light hits an object, part of it is absorbed while the rest is reflected to a distinct wavelength than others. If all wavelengths are reflected, it appears white. If it reflects none, absorbing all — it appears black.



In this instance, the surface has absorbed all wavelengths except 'yellow', which it reflects.

Turkey opens world's longest suspension bridge

March 29, 2022

On March 18, Turkish President Tayyip Erdogan opened a huge bridge that sets a new record for the world's longest suspension bridge. The "1915 Canakkale Bridge" crosses Turkey's Dardanelles Strait, linking Europe and Asia.

The country of Turkey is mainly in Asia. But part of it extends into Europe. The Dardanelles Strait is a thin band of water that separates the

The new bridge allows people to drive across the Dardanelles Strait in about six minutes. Before the bridge, the fastest way to cross the Strait was by boat. The trip was about an hour, but waiting to get on and off the boat could take hours longer.

The new bridge is a suspension bridge, which means that its middle section hangs between its two supports without any other supports underneath. Before this, the suspension bridge with the longest middle section was the Akashi Kaikyo Bridge, which connects two islands in Japan. The central section of the new bridge is just over two kilometres (1.25 miles) long - about 105 feet (32 metres) longer than the previous record.



The bridge is called the "1915 Canakkale Bridge". It's meant as a reminder of a big World War I struggle in the Dardanelles Strait in 1915. Over eight months, Turkey defeated an attack by navy ships from England and France trying to land soldiers in Gallipoli – now called Gelibolu.

The bridge, which runs from Gelibolu to Canakkale, was built by Turkish and South Korean companies working together.
