



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Leonardo Da Vinci

Leonardo da Vinci was a genius in many fields. He excelled at painting, drawing, sculpture, architecture and engineering. He was a leading figure of the Italian Renaissance, a period of great achievement in the arts and sciences.

Leonardo's paintings 'Mona Lisa' and 'Last Supper' won him great fame. But he is also well known for his scientific studies.

Early life

Leonardo da Vinci was born on April 15, 1452, near Vinci, a small town near Florence in Italy. When he was about 15, he began studying with the artist Andrea del Verrocchio in Florence. Verrocchio taught him about painting, sculpture and the design of mechanical devices.

Paintings and notebooks

Leonardo worked in Milan as a painter and engineer for the Duke of Milan from 1482 to 1499. He completed only six works in 17 years, but these finished works include 'The Last Supper' and 'The Virgin of the Rocks.'



The Last Supper

'The Last Supper' is an immense wall painting in the dining hall of the monastery of Santa Maria delle Grazie. Both paintings are widely acknowledged to be artistic masterpieces.

In 1980, the United Nations Educational, Scientific and Cultural Organization (UNESCO) declared Santa Maria delle Grazie with 'The Last Supper' a World Heritage site.

While in Milan, Leonardo also became interested in observing nature. He thought that by carefully observing objects and accurately

drawing them, an artist could obtain scientific knowledge. Leonardo recorded his observations in a series of notebooks. The notebooks cover a variety of subjects, including painting, architecture, machinery, the structure of the human body and the science of

flight. For example, more


than 300 years before flying machines were perfected, Leonardo developed plans for an airplane and a helicopter.

Later years

In 1503, Leonardo returned to Florence. There he continued his scientific studies and worked on four great paintings, including the 'Mona Lisa'. He spent some of his later years in Milan and Rome. In 1516, he moved to Cloux (now Clos-Lucé), France, to work for the French king. He spent most of his time there editing his writings. Leonardo died in Cloux on May 2, 1519.

Fun Facts

- Da Vinci was a gentle man who loved animals. He was a vegetarian – rare in his day. He sometimes bought live animals in the market and let them go.
- Da Vinci left several notebooks of his ideas.
 Bill Gates bought some of his notes for \$30 million.
- Da Vinci was fascinated by the human body. He examined dead bodies to learn more. Later, the Pope forbid this work.
- After the Duke of Milan fell from power, Da Vinci worked for the Pope. Later he worked for King Francis I, King of France.
- The king gave Da Vinci an elegant manor.
 It is said that the king cradled Da Vinci's head as he died.

NASA's final Moon rocket test cancelled

April 5, 2022

NASA has cancelled an important test of its giant Space Launch System (SLS) rocket because of safety issues.

Known as the "wet dress rehearsal," it was due to be the final major test before the Artemis 1 mission this summer – an un-crewed flight to the Moon.

However, a problem with the launch platform meant that a key part – which helps to "keep out hazardous gases" – failed, cancelling the countdown test.

The US space agency hopes to send astronauts back to the Moon by 2026.

It is the latest delay to hit NASA's plans, which had originally aimed to complete a Moon landing in 2024.

The US team will now try again to complete testing.

If it goes to plan next time, the Artemis 1 rocket should do a crewless flyby of the Moon in a mission lasting around 26 days.

In May 2024, the Artemis 2 mission will do the same journey but with a crew inside.

Following that, Artemis 3 will send the first woman and first non-white astronaut to the Moon.

'Endurance' found after 106 years

The search for famed polar explorer Ernest Shackleton's ship Endurance, which sank in 1915, is finally over. On March 9, 2022, the Endurance22 expedition team announced the wreck had been found in the Weddell Sea off the coast of Antarctica.

The 106-year-old vessel lies at a depth of about 10,000 feet. It is just four miles away from the last location recorded by Endurance's captain Frank Worsley. The ship's near-pristine condition can be explained by the lack of wood-eating marine organisms in Antarctica's freezing waters.

Mensun Bound, Director of Exploration on the expedition, said in a statement. "This is by far the finest wooden shipwreck I have ever seen. It is upright, well proud of the seabed, intact, and in a brilliant state of preservation. You can even see 'Endurance' arced across the stern."

Shackleton and his crew of 27 left England aboard the 144-foot Endurance in 1914. The ship was headed to a bay on the Weddell Sea — the starting point of Shackleton's attempt to be the first to cross Antarctica by foot.

However, in early January 1915, Endurance was 100 miles from its destination when it got stuck in the Weddell Sea's thick ice.

Several attempts to free the ship failed, and things got only worse as the

temperatures dropped.
By the end of February, the Endurance was firmly settled in the thick ice.
The stranded crew spent the next eight months aboard the ship, hoping to complete the journey when the weather improved. However, on November 21, 1915, the massive boat succumbed to the heavy pressure from the ice and sank.

On April 24, 1916, the brave explorer and a handpicked crew of five embarked on the treacherous 800-mile open-boat journey across the freezing Southern Ocean waters. The exhausted adventurers made it to the Whaling Station on South Georgia Island after 16 days

After several challenges, the expedition members were finally picked up from Elephant Island on August 30, 1916. Shackleton never achieved his dream of crossing Antarctica on foot. However, the polar explorer's ability to survive and keep his crew members safe while stranded for nearly two years made him a hero worldwide.

A new home for Stan, the T. rex fossil

April 5, 2022

In 2020, Stan, one of the world's largest and most complete Tyrannosaurus Rex (T. rex) skeletons, was auctioned for a record \$27.5 million (\$31.8 m with fees and costs).

The precious fossil, bought by an anonymous private buyer, led many paleontologists to fret that the T. rex was lost to science forever. As it turns out, they had nothing to worry about.

On March 23, 2022, the officials of Abu Dhabi, the capital of the United Arab Emirates, revealed that the 39-foot-long (11.7-metre-long)

T. rex will be a star attraction in their new Natural History Museum scheduled to open in 2025.
