World Environment Day 2022

From June 5 – 16, 1972, the United Nations Conference on the Human Environment was held in Stockholm, Sweden. It was a landmark event as it was the first world conference on the environment, and resulted in the creation of the United Nations Environment Programme (UNEP), as well as the declaration of the celebration of World Environment Day (WED) two years later.

WED has been celebrated every year on June 5, to raise awareness on various environmental issues. WED 2022 marks the 50th anniversary of that conference and will be hosted by Sweden under the slogan "Only One Earth", mirroring the 1972 conference.



Deforestation

It has been estimated that 1 million species are under the threat of extinction due to habitat loss and other pressures on ecosystems. In 2021, the United Nations declared the Decade on Ecosystem Restoration (from WED 2021 to WED 2030), to encourage the protection of ecosystems around the world.

Why is it so important that ecosystems are restored?

The survival of the human race depends on nature and the inter-connected ecosystems of the planet. In economic terms, half the GDP in the world relies on nature and for every dollar channelled towards restoration, there is a return of up to USD 30 in economic benefits.

Annually, around 7 million people die prematurely due to air pollution – this is equivalent to 1 out of every 9 deaths.

How can we restore ecosystems?

When you think of ecosystem restoration, you might think of a large-scale reforestation project, but the wonderful thing is, even simply planting a tree in your garden is an act of restoration. No matter how big or small, every act is a step in the right direction. However, it is ultimately up to governments and the private sector to make the large-scale changes needed to save the planet on time and up to individuals to raise awareness and urge them to do so. After all, out of the billions of planets in the universe, there's only one that we can call home.

As the Cree proverb goes,

"Only when the last tree has been cut down, the last fish been caught and the last stream poisoned, will we realise we cannot eat money."



Ecosystem Restoration According to the UNEP, our current way of life is using up resources equivalent to that of 1.6 Earths (in its present state). While some ecosystems have been damaged past the point of recovery, many can still be restored.

Dolphins


Dolphins are friendly and intelligent mammals. Their bodies can be grey, white, black, bluish grey, peach or light pink according to their species. A group of dolphins are called a pod.

Birth

A female dolphin stays pregnant for about 12 months but it can change according to the species. When a dolphin is born, the mother pushes it to the surface so it can breathe. A baby dolphin is called a calf.

Species

There are 49 species of dolphins Eg: Orca, Bottle-nose dolphin, Striped dolphin, Baiji and Tucuxi.





Habitat

Dolphins live in oceans and seas, harbours and bays, but this can change if the dolphin likes warm or cold water.

Breathing

A dolphin breaths air, so they have to go to the surface. When they reach the surface, their blow hole opens and when

they go back under water the blowhole closes.

Movement

Dolphins have pectoral fins, which help them steer. The dorsal fin helps with stability. They have strong muscles in their fins so they can go really fast. Their veins and flukes help keep their bodies warm.

A dolphin can swim up to 30 miles per hour.

Voice of the Garden - Bees

Bees are small and fascinating insects with wings and a yellow and black body. There are about 20,000 species of bees and over 500 species of them live in colonies. Bees look the same as wasps but they have more hair and thicker bodies. They have a small poisonous stinger at the back of their body to defend themselves when they face a threat.

Bees feed on pollen and nectar collected from flowers. They are attracted to blue and yellow flowers and visit them more often. They collect the pollen into a pollen basket on their back



legs when they visit a flower.

Inside a bee colony, there are about 3000 to 40,000 bees. They are categorised into three kinds as the queen, the drones and the workers. The queen bee is the mother of all the bees in the colony and lays about 600 to 700 eggs per day. The drones are the male bees. They do not have a sting. The worker bees are female bees. They clean the hire, produce the wax, collect food, guard and feed the larvae and keep them warm.





When the bee colony becomes overcrowded some bees fly off to a different location. This event is called swarming. It is part of the annual lifecycle of the bee colony.

Bees are important insects as they pollinate plants and provide honey, which is a very healthy medicine.

Albert Einstein once said, "The day bees vanish from earth... man will go not long after".

Many bees are slowly disappearing all over the world due to harmful human activities nowadays and it is our duty to protect these creatures.


