Maths in Action 68 By R. N. A. de Silva

The 15 puzzle is a sliding puzzle that has 15 square tiles numbered 1 to 15, leaving one unoccupied tile in a frame with four rows and four columns. The goal of the puzzle is to place the tiles in numerical order.

The original version of the puzzle was developed in 1874 by Noyes Palmer Chapman, a postmaster in New York, USA. Originally the tiles were loose, and the player placed them randomly and attempted to solve. The new version was popularized by Sam Loyd in 1914. He offered a prize of \$1000 to anyone solving the puzzle with 14 and 15 swapped as shown below. But now we know that is not solvable.



Mathematicians have determined precisely which initial arrangements of the tiles can lead to solutions. The checking for solvability of a puzzle where the blank tile is the last tile, is shown below, through an example.

Consider the following initial arrangement, where the blank tile is marked as X.

1	2	3	10
4	5	6	11
7	8	Х	9
12	13	14	15

The Fifteen Puzzle

First, move 9 to the blank tile and then move 15 up, so that the last tile is left blank.

1	2	3	10
4	5	6	11
7	8	9	15
12	13	14	Х

Now, write the numbers in a single row in that order.

1 2 3 10 4 5 6 11 7 8 9 15 12 13 14

A pair of tiles (a, b) forms an inversion if b < a. We need to count all the inversions.

There are no inversions for 1 as all the numbers to the right are greater than 1. The same is true for 2 and 3. But if you consider 10 the numbers 4, 5, 6, 7, 8 and 9 are less than 10. Therefore, there are 6 inversions. No inversions for 4, 5 and 6. But for 11, there are 3 inversions as 7, 8 and 9 are less than 11. Similarly, no inversions for 7, 8, 9, 12, 13 and 14, But there are 3 inversions for 15.

The total number of inversions is 6 + 3 + 3 = 12.

If the total number of inversions is even, it is solvable. If the total is odd, it is not solvable.







Now that we know that it is solvable, try to see whether you can solve it to arrange all numbers from 1 to 15 in that order.

Beaver

Beavers are famously busy, and they turn their talents to reengineering the landscape as few other animals can. When sites are available, beavers burrow in the banks of rivers and lakes. But they also transform less suitable habitats by building dams. Felling and gnawing trees with their strong teeth and powerful jaws, they create massive log, branch and mud structures to block streams and turn fields and forests into the large ponds that beavers love.

Beaver Lodges

Domelike beaver homes, called lodges, are also constructed of branches and mud. They are often strategically located in the middle of ponds and can only be reached by underwater entrances. These dwellings are home to extended families of monogamous parents, young kits and the yearlings born the previous spring.

Beavers are herbivores and prefer to eat leaves, bark, twigs, roots and aquatic plants.

Beavers are the largest rodents (gnawing animals) in North America. Beavers are the second largest rodents in the world, behind the South American capybara.

Aquatic Adaptations

These large rodents move with an ungainly waddle on land but are graceful in the water, where they use their large, webbed rear feet like swimming fins, and their paddle-shaped tails like rudders. These attributes allow beavers to swim at speeds of up to five miles an hour. They can remain underwater for 15 minutes without surfacing, and have a set of transparent eyelids that function much like goggles. Their fur is naturally oily and


waterproof. There are two species of beavers, which are found in the forests of North America,

the forests of North America, Europe and Asia. These animals are active all winter, swimming and foraging in their ponds even when a layer of ice covers the surface.

Platinum Jubilee: Tree of trees to be planted around UK

October 4, 2022

he Queen's Platinum Jubilee tree sculpture - a giant tree made up of smaller trees - is being split up across the UK.

The sculpture - called the Canopy of Trees - was made up of 350 saplings.

All the trees are being sent across the UK and every county will get one.

It's a part of a scheme set up for the Platinum Jubilee called the Queen's Green Canopy - to help encourage communities to plant trees.

The Canopy of Trees was made for Queen Elizabeth's Platinum Jubilee in June, which celebrated her spending over 70 years on the throne. The huge sculpture was 69ft tall, and stood outside Buckingham Palace in June.

The trees then spent the summer being looked after in a special tree nursery in Cambridgeshire, to prepare them for being moved across the country.

The Queen's Green Canopy was set up in the Queen's name, to plant trees all over the country.

The trees will be planted during tree planting season - which runs between October and March.

The first tree will be put up at the Royal Chelsea Hospital in London. As well as being planted all over the



350 special trees are being sent all over the UK to celebrate the Queen

UK, 20 trees have been given to charities that the Queen cared about.

These include an anti-pollution group in Wales, and a food bank in Scotland.

They will get a special pot with their sapling in, engraved with the Queen's royal symbol.

The mystery behind Saturn's rings may have finally been solved

The origin of Saturn's beautiful rings and the reason for the planet's unusually large 27 degree-tilt on its axis has puzzled astronomers for decades. Scientists had initially believed that the rings had been a part of the planet since its formation billions of years ago. However, recent research indicates that the planet acquired them sometime between 100 and 200 million years ago.

They had also theorized that Saturn's tilt was the result of a gravitational pull from Neptune. But data from NASA's Cassini mission showed that Saturn had fallen outside Neptune's grasp at some point in the past. Now, a new study published in the journal Science on September 16, 2022 suggests that an extinct moon may be responsible for the rings and the unusual tilt.

Jack Wisdom, a planetary science professor at the Massachusetts Institute of Technology, and his team assert that Saturn, which currently has 83 moons, once had at least one more. They speculate the satellite, nicknamed Chrysalis, was tugging at the planet in a way that allowed it to have gravitational interaction with Neptune.

However, about 160 million years ago, Chrysalis got too close to Saturn, causing it to rip apart and fall into the planet. The loss of the Moon was enough to remove Saturn from Neptune's grasp and leave it with its presentday tilt. Wisdom and his team further

hypothesize that fragments from the destroyed Moon settled into the planet's orbit and formed its iconic rings. This theory also helps explain why the rings are far younger than the planet.

"We like it because it's a scenario that explains two or three different things that were previously not thought to be related," says Wisdom. "The rings are related to the tilt, who would ever have guessed that?"
