


Even today, we can find some simple things such as curtains, controlled by a remote to open and close.


Although it has its disadvantages, the things that the development of technology has made possible, are spectacular, and unimaginable. Where would we be without it?

We are unable to picture what the future would be exactly. So until our housework-doing robots present themselves to us, let's go sweep the house (with a broom)!




