



When that great day dawned, the machine was presented to her, with permission from Dilshi to get back to the village for good – Lamaya was shocked into tears.







Usain Bolt

Usain Bolt is widely considered to be the greatest sprinter in world history. He is currently the fastest person (based on the 100 m) who ever lived. He holds the world records for both the 100 m and 200 m. He also shares the 4 x 100m relay world record with Jamaican teammates Yohan Blake, Nesta Carter and Michael Frater.

His surname, or last name, is very fitting of the world's fastest man because the word "bolt" is often associated with lightning, which symbolizes speed.

Growing up?

Usain St. Leo Bolt was born on August 21,1986 in Trelawny, Jamaica. He grew up loving and appreciating sports. In high school, he decided to shift his focus from cricket to track and field. He captured numerous championships, gold medals and world records at the junior track and field level which caught the attention of the rest of the world.

Rise to fame

Although the beginning of his professional career was plagued with injuries, Usain Bolt still managed to compete and even contend in most competitions. The turning point of his career was when he broke the 200 m Jamaican record with a time of 19.75 seconds. He soon went on to break the 100 m world record with a time of 9.72 seconds.

Fun Facts

As a child, Usain Bolt showed an interest in playing cricket and football (in America 'soccer'). He has also shown an interest in playing both sports professionally today.

- Usain Bolt's first world record breaking performance in the 100 m was preceded by a very strong lighting storm.
- Usain Bolt has broken both the 100 m world record and the 4 x 100 m world record three times and has broken the 200 m world record twice.
- Usain Bolt has written three autobiographies.
- Usain Bolt partnered with a mobile gaming company to make his own themed mobile game simply called Bolt! in which players control him and fight pirates.
- At the Beijing 2008 Olympics, during the final seconds of the 100 m event, Usain Bolt slowed down considerably to start celebrating his inevitable gold medal finish, unaware that he was on pace for approximately a 9.55 second 100 m time. One of his shoes was also untied.



Usain Bolt's career is defined by his performances at the Olympics. At the Beijing 2008 Olympics, he broke his previous world best time in the 100 m with a time of 9.69 seconds as well as he broke the 200 m world record

> with a time of 19.30 seconds.

London 2012 Olympics

Usain Bolt successfully defended his titles in the 100 m with a time of 9.63 seconds and 200 m, as well as breaking the 4 x 100 m relay world record with Jamaican teammates Yohan Blake, Nesta Carter and Michael Frater with a time of 36.84 seconds.

> Usain Bolt is the only athlete to win the Olympic gold medal in the 100 m and 200 m sprints in three consecutive Olympic games.

New species of ancient European panda identified

cientists have discovered a new species of the giant panda, which would have lived 4.5 million years

They think it would the "last known" and "most evolved" panda species in Europe.

A fossil of a tooth found in wetlands in Bulgaria in the 1970s was key to the discovery, with the team able to use them to identify they had come from a type of panda.

Their findings were published in the Journal of Vertebrate Paleontology, which looks into the study of cells and science, as well as ancient life — from dinosaurs to prehistoric plants and animals.

One of the co-authors of the study Dr. Spassov said it had taken him a long time to realise that this was an unknown fossil giant panda.

He said: "This discovery shows how little we still know about ancient nature and demonstrates also that historic discoveries in palaeontology can lead to unexpected results, even today."

How different would ancient pandas have been to the ones we see today?

The prehistoric panda is not a direct ancestor of the giant pandas you'll be used to seeing, but it is a very close relative.

There are also a few differences between this ancient European panda and giant pandas today.

According to the study, the European panda wouldn't have survived on bamboo alone but rather ate a more varied diet of softer plants.

The fossil records and the parts of the teeth uncovered from this period suggest they wouldn't have had strong enough teeth to crush the woody stems.

Their diet may also have been influenced by those of other animals living in similar areas at the time, as they competed for food sources.

Dr. Spassov said: "The likely competition with other species, especially carnivores and presumably

other bears, explains the closer food specialisation of giant pandas to vegetable food in humid forest conditions."

From looking at their teeth, the team think the ancient panda would have been the same size or a little smaller than giant pandas.

They say the species may have become extinct due to dramatic climate change events, which would have massively changed the terrain and surrounding environment.

Mischievous Walrus Freya causes chaos in Norway

reya, a 1,300-pound (589 kg) walrus, has been on an epic adventure since leaving her home in the Arctic Ocean in 2019. Over the past three years, the juvenile female has visited the coasts of Sweden, Denmark, England, Germany, the Netherlands and the Shetland Islands.

Freya, who is identified by her small tusks, white scar on her right nostril, and previous injury on her flipper, has now arrived in Norway.

The walrus was first spotted in the waters of the small coastal town of Kragerø in mid-July 2022, where she became an instant celebrity. After spending a few days relaxing aboard the docked leisure vessels, Freya headed over to Oslo's Frognerkilen Bay.

Since her arrival, the mischievous animal has been seen chasing a duck and attacking a swan.

However, the hefty walrus spends most of her day resting on one of the many small boats docked at the bay. While not having access to their boats is frustrating for owners, even more so is the fact that the vessels often end up getting destroyed due to Freya's weight. Local officials have tried to persuade Freya to rest on a custom wooden dock they built. But the walrus seems to prefer private vessels.

Local animal experts initially considered attempting to move Freya safely back to her home in the Arctic Circle. However, after seeing how well she is doing, they have decided to leave the walrus alone.

"She is doing well, feeding, resting and seems to be in good condition," Norway's Directorate of Fisheries said on July 25, 2022.

But they are also warning the crowds of people rushing to catch a glimpse of Freya to do so from a distance — both for the sake of the animal's wellbeing and their own safety.

The officials say, "A walrus is not normally a danger to humans as long as you keep a safe distance. But if it is disturbed by humans and doesn't get the rest it needs, it may feel threatened and attack."
