

### Let's save trees!



The woodcutter said, "I will never cut down trees anymore."



# Asian Koel

The Asian koel (*Eudynamys scolopaceus*), known as the 'Koha' in Sri Lanka, is a member of the cuckoo order of birds, the Cuculiformes. It is found in the Indian subcontinent, China and Southeast Asia. It forms a super-species with the closely related Black-billed koels and Pacific koels which are sometimes treated as subspecies.

The Asian koel like many of its related cuckoo kin is a brood parasite that lays its eggs in the nests of crows and other hosts, who raise its young. They are unusual among the cuckoos in being largely frugivorous (feeding on fruit) as adults.

## Appearance

The male Asian koel is glossy bluish-black, with a pale greenish grey bill, the iris is crimson, and it has grey legs and feet. The female is brownish on the crown and has rufous streaks on the head. The back, rump, and wing coverts are dark brown with white and buff spots. The underparts are whitish but are heavily striped. The upper plumage of young birds is more like that of the male and they have a black beak.

## Distribution

Asian koels are mainly resident in southern Asia from Iran, India, Bangladesh and Sri Lanka to southern China and the Greater Sundas. They inhabit light woodlands, shrubby areas with scattered trees, gardens, plantations and urban areas.

## Habits and Lifestyle

Asian koels are shy birds that are usually more often heard than seen. They spend their time singly or in pairs hiding in the dense canopy.

Asian koels feed by day taking fruits directly from trees; they may sometimes defend favoured trees and chase away other frugivores.

Asian koels are very vocal especially during the breeding season, making a range of different calls. The familiar song of the male is a repeated 'koo-Ooo' and the female makes a rhythmic 'wook-wook' and shrill 'kik-kik-kik...' call.

## Diet and Nutrition

Asian koels are omnivores and consume a variety of insects, caterpillars, eggs and small vertebrates. Adults, however, feed mainly on fruit.

The breeding season of Asian koels varies depending on location. In the Indian subcontinent, it usually occurs from March to August. The female usually lays only 1 egg or 2 in a single nest but as many as 7 to 11 eggs have been reported from some host nests. A female may remove a host egg before laying.

The eggs of the koel hatch in 12 to 14 days, about 3 days ahead of the host chicks. The young koel does not always push out eggs or evict the host chicks, and initially calls like a crow. It usually fledges in 20 to 28 days and unlike some other cuckoos, the young koel does not attempt to kill the host chicks.

## Population Threats

There are no major threats to Asian koels at present.

## Ecological Niche

Asian koels are especially important in the dispersal of the sandalwood tree in India.



## FUN FACTS

- Asian koels have great potential in colonizing new areas. They first arrived in Singapore in the 1980s and became very common birds. Some populations may also make long-distance movements being found in places like Australia.
- Asian koels are unusual among the cuckoos in being largely fond of fruits as adults.
- Asian koels consume the fruits of a poisonous plant *Cascabela thevetia* which are known to be toxic to mammals.
- The Asian koel is a widely used symbol in Indian and Nepali poetry.
- Asian koels were once very popular in India as cagebirds. Feeding even on boiled rice, these hardy birds lived in captivity for as long as 14 years.

**Thailand celebrates Songkran 2023 with huge water festival**

Tens of thousands of people in south-east Asia have been celebrating Songkran, Thailand’s largest and most important annual festival which marks the beginning of the Thai New Year.

An important event on the Buddhist calendar, many families wake up early during Songkran and visit temples. It is tradition to pour scented water onto sacred statues of Buddha - which symbolically represents purification and good fortune.

People also prepare by cleaning houses, schools and other public spaces. However the festival has now become famous around the world for its huge water fight which takes place in towns, villages and cities around the country - in fact, it’s so big it’s thought to be the world’s largest water fight!

The festival lasts for three days and is celebrated each April, Thailand’s hottest month of the year. As well as being a handy way of keeping cool in the heat, splashing each other with water is said to wash away bad luck from the previous year.

People use everything from hoses, buckets, bowls and water pistols to spray family, friends and even strangers.

Songkran has become a major tourist attraction, with thousands of people from around the world travelling to Thailand especially to be there for the event!

Animals have also been getting involved with the celebrations! Children and elephants in northern Thailand’s



Ayutthaya province have been getting in on the action by splashing each other with water.



Songkran is also widely observed in other south-east Asian countries including Cambodia, Laos and Myanmar.

**Earth Day 2023: Invest in Our Planet**

On April 22, 2023, over a billion people worldwide celebrate Earth Day with various activities. Some plant trees. Others participate in neighbourhood clean-up efforts or enjoy a nature walk. The modern environmental movement began on April 20, 1970. On that day, 20 million Americans took to the streets to urge the government to take steps to protect our planet.



The theme encourages governments, businesses and individuals to take action collectively. Local officials can lead the charge by banning disposable plastics or restoring ecosystems.

Businesses can help by reducing their environmental impact.

For example, clothing manufacturers can choose natural or recycled fabrics. Restaurants can seek out sustainable food sources.

Individuals of all ages can also make a difference with small lifestyle changes. Purchase everyday items, like shoes, from a “green” business. Turn off lights and devices when not in use. Bike to school instead of driving. Reduce plastic waste by using reusable water bottles and lunch boxes.

How will you “Invest in Our Planet” on Earth Day — and every day?

It led to the passage of landmark environmental protection laws in the United States. They include the Clean Air Act, the Clean Water Act, and the Endangered Species Act. In 2016, United Nations chose Earth Day to sign the Paris Climate Agreement into force. But more must be done to undo the impact of careless human behaviour on the environment.

Earth Day 2023 focuses on the need to “Invest in Our Planet.”

- Invest in a reusable water bottle.
- Say no to single-use plastic utensils/straws and bring your own bag to the store.
- Choose zero waste toiletries, like solid shampoo bars, safety razors, etc.

**#3 EAT PLANT-BASED FOOD PRODUCTS**

*Did you know?* Currently, livestock production...

- contributes nearly 15% of all global greenhouse gas emissions.
- occupies at least 30% of our habitable land.
- is causing deforestation of our valuable rainforests.

- Eat one plant-based meal a day for a year; it will save almost 200,000 gallons of water!
- Find plant based alternatives staple food items (i.e. plant-based milk, yogurt, and creamer).
- Transform favorite dishes (i.e. pizza, pasta, and stir-fry) to include more veggies.

**#4 REDUCE FOOD WASTE**

*Did you know?*

- 1/3 of all food produced each year is wasted (approx. 1.3 billion tons)
- When organic material, like food, breaks down in landfill, it creates methane, a greenhouse gas over 20 times more potent than carbon dioxide.

- Have a well-thought-out meal plan and buy only what you need.
- Freeze excess produce and add to your food while cooking. Old veggies still make good soups, stews, and curries.
- Freezing leftover perishable ingredients can also increase the longevity of your food, so they are fresh when you are ready to use them.
- Compost leftover or unused food.
