

# Edward Lear

The English humorist Edward Lear made famous the limerick form of verse and illustrated his work with amusing pictures.

The gentle, friendly man was always fond of children, and most of his writing was done for their pleasure.

Edward Lear was born on May 12, 1812 in Holloway in Middlesex, England. He was the youngest surviving child of the 21 children of Ann and Jeremiah Lear (his parents).

He was raised by his sister, Ann, who was 21 years older than him. When he was four years old, he left the family home and lived with his sister.





The Owl and the Pussycat

Edward Lear was often unwell. From the age of six he suffered from asthma and epileptic seizures. Later in life, he became partially blind, and battled severe depression.

In his teens, Edward Lear was becoming an accomplished artist. He got a job as a draughtsman by the Zoological Society. In the early 1830s, he was employed by the Earl of Derby to produce drawings of the birds and animals in his private menagerie.

When he was 19, his illustrations of the Family of Psittacidae, or Parrots, was published in 1830.

He became one of the best ornithological (bird) artists of his generation.

He also painted landscapes, especially during his travels. He visited Italy, Greece and Egypt, and he often spent his summers on Monte Generoso on the Swiss / Italian border.

He also visited India and Ceylon (as Sri Lanka was then known).

Lear was an excellent musician. He played flute, accordion, guitar and the piano. He composed music for poems – his own, and for the works of famous Victorian poets.

In 1846, Lear's 'A Book of Nonsense' was published. In 1871, his 'Nonsense Songs, Stories, Botany and Alphabets' was published. This book included his most famous work, 'The Owl and the Pussycat.'

Edward Lear is often credited with popularising the limerick. He created the word 'runcible', but nobody is sure what it means! He started to write a follow-up to 'The Owl and the Pussycat', called 'The Children of the Owl and the Pussycat', but he didn't get to complete it before his death.

He was friends with Alfred Lord Tennyson, and set some of his poems to music.

Towards the end of his life, Edward Lear settled in San Remo, in Italy. In 1888, he died of heart disease at his villa. He is buried in the Cemetery Foce in San Remo.

In 1988, to mark the centenary of Edward Lear's death, the Royal Mail produced a set of commemorative stamps in the UK.

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# Walrus

alruses have long tusks and a prominent mustache. These large marine mammals are found near the Arctic Circle. They are extremely social and snort and bellow loudly at their companions. During the mating season they are quite aggressive.

Walruses have wrinkled brown and pink skin, long, coarse whiskers, flat flippers, and lots of blubber on their bodies to keep them warm in the cold Arctic water. They can slow down their heartbeat to withstand the chilly water temperatures and to help them stay under water for as long as ten minutes.

Their long tusks are useful in many ways. They use them to pull their enormous bodies out of frigid waters, and seem to walk on their tusks. They also use their tusks to break breathing holes into ice from below. Tusks are found on both males and females and keep growing throughout their lives. These tusks are actually canine teeth and can grow to be about three feet (one metre) long.



Their whiskers are very sensitive and help the walruses find their favourite meals, such as clams, way down in the deep, dark ocean floor. Their whiskers are longest at the corners of their mouth.

Only Native Americans are currently allowed to hunt walruses, as the species' survival was threatened by past overhunting. Hunters in the  $18^{th}$  and  $19^{th}$ centuries captured walruses for their tusks, oil, skin and meat and now there aren't any

> walruses in the Gulf of St. Lawrence and around Sable Island. off the coast of Nova Scotia.

> Walruses have an air sac under their throat, which helps them float in the water so they can sleep!

#### **WALRUS FACTS**

- There are two sub-species of walrus
- The scientific name for a walrus is 'Odobenus rosmarus'. That's Latin for 'tooth-walking sea-horse'!
- Walrus tusks can be over 90 cm long!
- Thick layers of blubber protect walruses from the
- Walruses weigh up to 1.5 tonnes! Even baby walruses are huge! These chunky critters, known as calves, can weigh up to 75 kg at birth – that's the same weight as some adult humans!
- Their huge size comes from a steady diet of molluscs, crustaceans and worms!
- Walruses can sleep in water!
- Walruses can live for up 40 years
- These astonishing animals are very sociable, but can be aggressive. A walrus colony is a noisy place! These animals live in large groups, known as herds, which gather together on land.
- Indigenous Americans are the only people allowed to hunt walruses
- Walruses are very sensitive to changes in their environment. Despite their formidable size, they are easily spooked! In walrus herds, any sign of danger can cause stampedes as the animals flee land and head towards the safety of water.

#### Mount Etna erupts

May 23, 2023

Italy's largest volcano Mount Etna erupted on Sunday spewing ash onto Catania, the largest city in eastern Sicily.

Sicily is an island which is part of Italy, and is also close to the island of Malta.

Many parts of Catania have been covered in a layer of dark gritty dust, with images showing cars covered.

### What happened when Etna erupted?

More than 50 flights in and out of the city had been cancelled after the eruption spewed volcanic ash onto runways at the Catania Fontanarossa Airport – but resumed again on Monday morning.

Residents of the towns of Adrano and Biancavilla reported hearing loud booms coming from the volcano on Sunday, but there have been no reported injuries.

The 3,330 metre high volcano erupts several times a year, firing lava and ash high over the Mediterranean island, and experts are trying to work out how serious this eruption is.



Mount Etna is the highest active volcano in Europe and the largest of three volcanos in Italy. The volcano was listed as a Unesco World Heritage Site in 2013 and attracts thousands of visitors a year.

#### Chelsea Flower Show 2023

May 23, 2023

The famous flower show is back for another year, running from the May 22 - 27.

Catherine, Princess of Wales, hosted a children's picnic at a newly created garden at the show. A number of schools were invited to bring children along, which marks the first time in the

event's 110-year history that a children's picnic has taken place.

A children's choir also performed at the Chelsea Flower Show this year.

Visitors at this year's event will get the chance to enjoy a number of specially planted gardens highlighting different themes and trends.
