




More than 30,000 people died in Sri Lanka in this tragic event.

The least used letter is 'z' with a frequency percentage of 0.074% followed by 'q' with 0.095%.

The use of letter frequencies

play an important role in cryptograms and the Arabian mathematician Al-Kindi had begun using letter frequency analysis in developing a method to break ciphers in the 9th century.

Letter frequencies also have a connection with the design of keyboard layouts. To figure out the letter frequencies, large amounts of text need to be analyzed. However, these calculations have been made easier with modern computers. An analysis of entries in the concise Oxford dictionary, gives the following order in terms of their occurring frequency.

e, a, r, i, o, t, n, s, l, c, u, d, p, m, h, g, b, f, y, w, k, v, x, z, j, q.



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Sri Lankan Jungle Fowl

he Sri Lankan jungle fowl (Gallus lafayetii) first described in 1831, is a member of the family Gallus, the same family as the domestic chicken. The ancestor to all domestic chickens is the Red jungle fowl (Gallus gallus).

There are four species of Gallus recorded from Asia. The Red jungle fowl (Gallus gallus), Grey jungle fowl (Gallus sonneratii), Green jungle fowl (Gallus varius) and Sri Lankan jungle fowl (Gallus lafayetii).

The Sri Lanka jungle fowl is endemic to Sri Lanka, and is not found anywhere else in the world. It has the distinct honour of being the national bird of Sri Lanka and is depicted in postage stamps etc.

Physical Description

As the norm for the genus Gallus, the males and females can be easily identified due to their different colours. Males are reddish orange to yellow in colour, sporting a red comb (crest) and a yellow patch in the centre. Their tail is metallic blue-black.



Female jungle fowl



The females are usually different shades of brown in colour with black markings and buff bands on top. They have reddish-brown and black wavy lines, streaked with brownish-buff below, and the rest being largely black-streaked.

The male ranges from 66 - 72 cm in length, and the female 35 cm in length.

Biology

The jungle fowl is a terrestrial species and is found always scratching the ground for food as with the domestic

> chicken. They are omnivorous by habit and feed on a myriad of food, ranging from worms, fruits, frogs and other vertebrates and invertebrates.

The female lays two to four eggs on nests abandoned by other birds or even squirrels, or on nests built on the forest floor of Sri Lanka's hill country. Males play an active role in protecting the nests and in rearing chicks.

The call of the jungle fowl is said to sound like the name John Joyce, which is repeated every few seconds. They are also known to flap their wings, this sound is made when a male announces his arrival or when there is a territorial dispute amongst males.

Habitat and Distribution

This species has a wide distribution range covering all climatic zones, from the low country to the highest peaks found in Sri Lanka. It is commonly found in forest and scrub habitats.

Threats and Conservation

Sri Lankan jungle fowl populations are believed to be stable across the country and no conservation action has been taken yet.

River Seine: Big clean-up abead of Paris Olympics

here's only a year to go until the Paris Olympics and preparations are well under way to welcome athletes and spectators.

Host cities typically make a big effort to clean up their appearance as all the cameras will be focused on them for the famous sporting event.

In Paris they've been working hard to clean up their dirty river, the River Seine, which flows through the heart of the French capital.

For 100 years swimming was banned in the river because of the levels of water pollution that could make people ill.

But after years of work, and more than 1.4 billion euros (£1.2bn) of investment, the Seine is going to be ready to welcome swimmers and divers back once more.



River Seine in Paris

It will play host to three Olympic events – triathlon, marathon swimming and paratriathlon. There will also be three open-air swimming areas by 2025, for everyone to enjoy.

"When people see athletes swimming in the Seine with no health problems, they'll be confident themselves to start going back in the Seine," says Pierre

Rabadan, the city's deputy mayor, who is also overseeing the Paris Olympics.

The problem was, for years industrial waste poured into the river polluting the water.

The city's 19th Century "single-system" drainage didn't help either.

It meant water from household kitchens and bathrooms mixed with sewage from the toilets. Normally this flowed through tunnels beneath the streets to the outskirts of Paris where it could be cleaned in water treatment centres.

But, when the rain was too heavy, and there was too much water in the system, some of that waste water drained into the Seine.

In the past 20 years the drainage system has been improved by engineers who built a big underground reservoir to store the excess water during heavy rain.

It means, thankfully, there is less faecal (poo) bacteria floating in the river now



Paris 2024: Meet the new mascots for the Olympics

This is Olympic Phryges (R) and Paralympic Phryges (L) – the new mascots for the Paris 2024 Olympics and Paralympics. Their shape is based on a Phrygian cap which is the same sort of hat 'The Smurfs' wear. They were worn during the French Revolution, which organisers say is the reason they were chosen as mascots – to represent the power of sport.

The Paralympic Phryges (pronounced *fri-jee-uhs*) has a running blade. It's the first mascot ever to have a visible disability. Organisers of the games say they want to send a strong message to promote inclusion. The two characters apparently have different personalities which come together to make them stronger. Their motto is: "Alone we go faster, but together we go further".
