





World Migratory Bird Day

When is World Migratory Bird Day and why is it observed?

World Migratory Bird Day is held twice a year, on the second Saturday of May and October, reflecting the varying migration periods in the northern and southern hemispheres; in 2023, the days fell on May 13 and October 14. Its aim is to raise awareness about the need to protect migratory birds and their habitats.

Why do birds migrate?

As seasons change and with it the weather and availability of food, birds are compelled to travel to habitats that will continue to let them thrive. The change in sunlight triggers hormones that cause them to become restless, flock together, and eat more in order to fuel up for their journey. This is called 'Zugunruhe', which means migratory restlessness and is derived from the German words "zug" ("to move") and "unruhe" ("restless anxiety").

To the moon and back



In the 1680s, British educator Charles Morton theorised about the disappearance of birds during winter. While he was correct about why they disappeared (in search of food and more favourable climates), he was not quite right about where

they went: he believed they flew to the moon.

Highways in the sky

Birds have specific routes they follow when migrating, which are called flyways.

Longest non-stop flight



Bar-tailed godwits, who nest in Alaska, migrate to Australia or New Zealand, flying over 11,000 km non-stop, without resting, eating or drinking. The fastest recorded journey was just 8 days.

Longest migration

The Arctic tern holds the record for the longest migration for any animal – it travels from the Arctic to the Antarctic, and back, every year, covering around 40,000 km annually.



The 2023 theme is "Water: Sustaining Bird Life" to highlight the importance of water to migratory birds.

Water and its related habitats (such as lakes, rivers, streams, ponds, marshes, swamps and coastal wetlands) are relied upon by migratory birds for breeding, resting, refueling during their migratory journey and wintering.

However, due to factors such as climate change and pollution, these ecosystems are at risk. According to the United Nations Environment Programme (UNEP), 35% of wetlands around the

world have been lost in the last five decades, and more are at risk of disappearing. For example, the Great Salt Lake in Utah, which is the largest saltwater lake in the Western Hemisphere and utilised by over a million shorebirds, may be gone in about five years.

Therefore, World Migratory Bird Day is a call to action to protect migratory birds and their habitats and stopovers, internationally, as their ranges often extend across multiple countries.

Israel and Hamas: What's happening?

October 10

Charities and world leaders have called for children to be kept safe while fighting is ongoing between Palestinian militants and Israel.

ozens of armed fighters from Hamas - the Palestinian militant group - crossed into Israel from Gaza in a surprise attack on Saturday October 7, killing over 700 Israelis, according to the government.

The attacks by Hamas targeted civilians as well as soldiers and thousands of rockets were also launched by Hamas towards Israel.

Israel responded with air strikes into Gaza, saying it was targeting militant sites. The United Nations (UN) says these air strikes have displaced 123,000 Palestinians, and Gaza health officials say more than 500 people have been killed and over two thousand injured.


Although Hamas and Israel have been enemies for many years, this is the largest outbreak of violence in decades.

What is Israel?

Israel is a country in the Middle East, with a coastline on the Mediterranean Sea. It was created in 1948, following World War Two and the Holocaust, as a homeland for Jewish people.

Since then there has often been fighting between Israel, the Palestinians and neighbouring Arab countries, over land, and who it belongs to. Both Jews and Palestinian Arabs claim the land as their ancestral home.

Tensions are often high between Israel and Palestinians living in Gaza, the West Bank and East Jerusalem.



The Gaza Strip is a 41km (25-mile) long and 10kmwide territory between Israel, Egypt and the Mediterranean

About 2.3 million people live there and it's ruled by a Palestinian militant group called Hamas, which has fought Israel many times.

supplies to the area. Aid agencies say they are worried about the safety of civilians in Gaza

Israel responded to recent attacks with air strikes on Gaza

as a result of the Israeli restrictions. About 80% of the population of Gaza depends on international aid, according to the UN, and about one million people rely on daily food aid.

What is Hamas?

Hamas is a Palestinian Islamist militant group which has ruled the Gaza strip since 2007.

The current fighting follows years of tensions between Hamas and Israeli governments.

In response to the attacks, Israel's prime minister Benjamin Netanyahu posted a video statement saying, "we are at war" and the Israeli military said it has begun bombing targets in the Gaza strip in response "to the barrages of rockets".

Hamas' military commander Mohammed Deif called on Palestinians everywhere to join the group's operation.
