Leonardo DiCaprio

Leonardo Wilhelm DiCaprio is an American actor and film producer. Known for his work as a leading man in biopics and period films, he is the recipient of numerous accolades, including an Academy Award, a British Academy Film Award and three Golden Globe Awards. As of 2019, his films have grossed over \$7.2 billion worldwide, and he has been placed eight times in annual rankings of the world's highest-paid actors.

Leonardo was born on November 11, 1974, in Los Angeles, California, the son of George DiCaprio and Irmalin Idenbirkin. His name allegedly came about because his pregnant mother was standing in front of a Leonardo da Vinci painting at a museum in Italy when he kicked, which made her decide to name him after the famous artist.

DiCaprio began his career in the late 1980s by appearing in television commercials. In the early 1990s, he had recurring roles in various television shows, such as the sitcom 'Parenthood', and had his first major film part as author Tobias Wolff in 'This Boy's Life' (1993). At age 19, he received critical acclaim and his first Academy Award and Golden Globe Award nominations for his performance as a developmentally disabled boy in 'What's Eating Gilbert Grape' (1993).
























DiCaprio is the founder of Appian Way Productions, a production company that has produced some of his films and the documentary series Greensburg (2008 – 2010), and the Leonardo DiCaprio Foundation, a nonprofit organization devoted to promoting environmental awareness. He regularly supports charitable causes and has produced several documentaries on the environment. He currently serves as one of the United Nations Messengers of Peace.



World Tsunami Awareness Day

November 5 was designated as World Tsunami Awareness Day by the UN General Assembly in 2015 to raise awareness about tsunamis and share innovative methods of risk reduction.

What is a tsunami?

A tsunami is a series of waves caused by a large displacement of water, such as that caused by an undersea earthquake (of a magnitude of at least 6.5 on the Richter scale), a landslide, or volcanic eruption. Meteors or asteroids can also be a cause, but this has not occurred

Tsunami waves can hit land every 5 to 60 minutes, over a span of hours, while receding far into the sea in between. In deep sea, tsunami waves are barely noticeable, appearing around a foot high, but slow down and gain energy and height in shallower waters. The highest wave ever recorded measured over 1,700 feet (during the 1958 tsunami in Lituya Bay, Alaska).

What does the word "tsunami" mean?

"Tsunami" literally means "harbour wave," derived from the Japanese words "tsu" (harbour) and "nami" (wave).

Tele-tsunamis

Occurring approximately every 15 years, a tele-tsunami (also called an ocean-wide or distant tsunami) is one which originates 1,000 km or more than 3 hours of tsunami travel time from the affected coastline. The last tele-tsunami to occur was the 2004 Indian Ocean Tsunami, which was nearly 19 years ago.

Signs of a tsunami



2011 Tōhoku Tsunami

On March 11, 2011, an earthquake of a magnitude of 9.0 struck Japan (the strongest ever to be recorded in its history), which produced a destructive tsunami, with waves up to 132 feet high. The disaster claimed the lives of around 15,000 people and left over 450,000 homeless. Due to its devastating impact on buildings and infrastructure, as well as the Fukushima Nuclear Power Plant, it is considered the costliest disaster in the world.

Girl Guiding and Google launch new online safety badges

The organisation behind Brownies and Guides have teamed up with one of the biggest tech companies in the world - Google.

They plan to teach girls essential skills for staying safe online and are launching two brand new badges for Girl Guiders to collect.

A new range of online safety activities will teach girls about online identities, the importance of being kind online, and how to deal with online bullying.



Special Google online safety badges are up for grabs

There will be activities aimed at different age ranges, suitable for Rainbows (aged 4 - 7), Brownies (aged 7 – 11), Guides (aged 11 - 14) and Rangers (aged 14 - 18).

Guides will learn about their digital footprint, which is all the information you leave behind when you are online, and protecting personal information.

The activities are designed to be done offline so people

> won't need an internet connection for them, making them accessible to all.

The announcement comes as the Online Safety Bill becomes law on Friday October 27.

The bill will make online and social media companies legally responsible for keeping children and young people safe online.



Brownies will be able to learn how to deal with online bullying through the Kingdom of Kindness activity.

The companies will have to remove any content that is illegal or contains harmful material - such as posts promoting abuse, eating disorders or

Politicians and children's charities behind the bill have been campaigning for five years and they say it will make children safer.

But others argue young people need to know more about staying safe online and can't rely on the law to protect them completely.

Race car using discarded electronics

lastic pollution gets a lot of attention. However, the ever-increasing pile of discarded electronics is not as well-publicized.

In 2014, over 49 million tons of toxic "e-waste" ended up in landfills. This includes computers, smartphones and televisions. If left unchecked, the number is expected to increase to 82 million tons by 2030.

Envision Racing hopes to raise awareness about the urgent need to recycle and repurpose our gadgets with a racing car made entirely from e-waste.

The fully functional 'Recover-E' vehicle was designed by UK artist Liam Hopkins. It is made with old electronic equipment from UK businesses and local schools. The sleek vehicle's front bumper is crafted from colour-coded layers of iPhones. Its body comprises flattened computer circuit boards. Even LED lights have been repurposed and fitted around the car.

"Unfortunately, today, we choose to discard and replace electronics instead of repairing and recycling them, leading to a global e-waste crisis. Through design and creativity, we want to show the issue of e-waste and its potential to accelerate the creation of a circular economy," says Hopkins.

Fittingly, Recover-E was unveiled on the eve of the final race of the 2022/2023

Formula E season on July 27, 2023. The international event is the world's first all-electric single-seater championship.

Envision Racing's Managing Director and CTO Sylvain Filippi says, "We are on a mission to tackle e-waste and ensure the precious metals, minerals, and materials in old laptops, mobile phones, and other electrical devices are extracted and reused."

Alongside the car, Envision Racing also launched a "Recover E Waste

to Race" competition. The contest challenged children and young adults to design a racing car prototype from discarded gadgets.

Four students from Abbott Community Primary School in Manchester, UK, won in the under ten-years category. Angelica Mirian from Mexico got top billing in the 12 to 16-year group. Hera May from the Philippines won in the 17 to 21-year section.
