Handprint Wreath

Materials:

- Paper plate
- Green cardstock
- Red pom poms
- Red craft rhinestones
- Red ribbon
- Green paint (optional)

Method

First cut out the circle centre of your paper plate.

Then paint it green. This is optional as most of the paper plate



won't be shown but a few small pieces may peek through.

Now glue the handprints to your paper plate. We used 12 handprints – six lighter green and six Christmas tree coloured handprints.

Alternate the different green handprints when gluing down.



Glue on your pom poms and rhinestones.

You can put three together to make them look like holly.



Finally add a red ribbon bow to the front and a loop of ribbon to the back for hanging.

If you want to be sure that the handprints will last the test of time you could also laminate them to keep them from getting wrinkled.

Santa strawberries

Ingredients

- 1 cup thickened cream
- 1/4 cup sifted icing sugar
- 2 punnets strawberries
- 2 soft liquorice sticks or 20 raisins

Method

- Gather all ingredients together.
- Whip cream and icing sugar together until quite firm.
- Hull the strawberries and then cut the tip off each.
- Sit each strawberry on a paper towel to soak up the juice.

- Fill a piping bag (or icing press) with a fluted nozzle with the cream mixture and pipe it onto the cut surface of the strawberry to create a head.

– Using the tip of the nozzle, join the cream and pipe a little 'beard' for the Santa halfway down the side of the strawberry.

Note

Adding the icing sugar to the cream gives it a bit of structure so it pipes and supports itself



It's important to make these join up so the cream on the head takes the weight of the cream from the beard.

- Place tip of strawberry on cream.
- Pipe a 'pompom' onto the top of the strawberry.
- Place liquorice or raisins cut in half for eyes and serve.

Reindeer

- Reindeer live in the Arctic tundra and damp forests of Greenland, Scandinavia, Russia, Alaska and Canada. In North America, reindeer are known as caribou – pronounced 'kar-i-boo!'
- As the name suggests, reindeer are a species of deer. They are the only deer species in which both the male and female can grow antlers. In fact, males' antlers can grow up to a whopping 1.4 metres in length and have as many 44 points, called 'tines'.
- Reindeer can live for up to 15 years in the wild, although domesticated reindeer (reindeer that are cared for by humans), can live for as long as 20 years.
- When grazing, a reindeer's preferred food is a lichen – a fungi, moss-like plant that's often found in high, open spaces. In fact, it's so popular with reindeer that it's now become known as 'reindeer lichen!'
- Humans have hunted reindeer for thousands of years for their meat, milk, fur and antlers – which can be fashioned into tools. For groups of people in Scandinavia (Norway, Sweden and Finland), Russia, China and Mongolia, reindeer herding is an ancient and important part of their culture.
- Male reindeer can grow up to 1.2 m tall at the shoulder and weigh up to 250 kg that's over three times the weight of an average person! Females are a little smaller than males.
- These beautiful beasts may be big, but they are still the target of hungry predators!

Wolverines, bears and even eagles are just some of the animals that prey on reindeer.

- Reindeer spend up to 40% of their lives in snow, so they've developed special adaptations to help them survive the chilly conditions. Their cloven hooves (divided into two) spread their weight, helping them stand on snow and soft ground. Their hollow fur helps to trap heat, and they're good swimmers, too!
- Have you watched the movie 'Frozen II'? The make-believe Northuldra tribe you see in the Enchanted Forest are based on the Sámi people – the famous reindeer herders of northern Norway! The Sámi really do use reindeer to pull sleighs through the snow, just like Sven does in the movie (and Santa does on Christmas Eve)!
- Believe it or not, reindeer actually do have red noses like Rudolph! Well, sort of... Lots of tiny veins circulate warm blood around their nose, heating up the air they breathe in so they don't get cold!

Trafalgar Square Christmas tree

London's famous Trafalgar Square Christmas tree has started its journey from Norway to the UK.

The iconic tree is a gift from the city of Oslo – Norway's capital city, and forms part of a longstanding tradition between the two cities going back more than 70 years.

The spruce will arrive in central London at the start of December, ahead of an official lights switch-on ceremony next week.

But why does Norway send the UK a Christmas tree every year? Keep reading to find out!

How does the Norway Christmas tree get to the UK?

This year's tree stands at 19 metres tall and came from the Nordmarka Forest, just north of Oslo.

It was cut down in an official public ceremony hosted by the Mayor of Oslo, Anne Lindboe, and was also attended by local primary school children, as well as officials involved with the maintenance of the forest.

The Trafalgar Square Christmas tree is usually a mature Norwegian spruce and between around 50 to 60 years old, due to the size needed.

The tree is loaded onto a ship avoiding any contact with salt water, which could damage it, and sets sail for the UK.

When Norway was invaded in 1940, the King of Norway at the time, Haakon VII, sought refuge in Britain and the Norwegian government-in-exile was established in London.

After the war, Norway began sending a Christmas tree to London every year as a way of saying thank you.

The tree symbolises the close friendship between the people of Norway and Britain.

The tree will be decorated in traditional Norwegian style, with vertical strings of energy-efficient lights, Westminster Council said ahead of the official switch-on ceremony on December 7.

The tree is selected from the forests surrounding Oslo with great care several months or even years in advance.

The tree then begins a long and complex annual journey to the UK.

Why does Norway send the UK a Christmas tree every year?

This year marks the 76th anniversary since Norway sent the first spruce to London.

The tradition started in 1947 and is a gift from Norway for Britain's support during World War II.
