

Lemon and ginger cheesecake

Treat your mum with these fun recipes on Mother's Day!

Ingredients

- 250 g (8 oz) gingernuts
- 125 g (4 oz) butter, melted
- 200 ml (7 fl. oz) double cream
- 397 g can condensed milk
- Zest and juice of 2 lemons
- Zest and juice of 1 lime

Method

1. Grease the sides of a 20 cm loose-based cake tin. Cut a circle of baking paper and use to line the bottom of the tin.

- 2. Put the biscuits in a bag and crush them with a rolling pin. Transfer to a bowl and stir in the melted butter. Mix to combine then press 200 g of the mixture into the base of your tin. This is just over half the mixture. Chill while you prepare the creamy filling.
- 3. Lightly whip the cream in a bowl and stir in the condensed milk, lemon and lime zest and 10-12 tablespoons juice. Spoon the creamy mixture over the biscuit base and smooth the top. Sprinkle over the rest of the biscuit mixture.



Chill until set, at least 4 hours but ideally overnight.

4. Remove from the tin and slice before serving.

Roll-up sandwiches

Ingredients

- Two slices of bread per person
- Margarine or butter
 - A selection of fillings such as:
- Cheese spread and pickle
- Grated cheese and ham
- Grated carrot and hummus
- Peanut butter and strawberry or raspberry jam
- Nutella
- Mashed banana

Method

1. First of all, carefully slice the crusts from the bread. The leftover crusts can be put into a food processor to make breadcrumbs, or you could toast them and use for 'croutons' in soup.

- 2. Now take a rolling pin and roll each slice of bread as thin as possible. Keep a watchful eye so that you don't get too carried away and make gaping holes!
- 3. Once the slices of bread are suitably flat and thin, use a table knife to spread on the filling, starting with the margarine or butter.
- 4. If you choose to use grated cheese or carrot in your roll-ups then it's best for an adult to do the grating, but kids will love the job of sprinkling it over the bread.
- 5. Mashed banana is a great filling as kids can use the back of a fork to mash the banana.



- 6. Whatever filling you decide to use, now is the time to roll up the bread. Make sure that the shortest edge is closest to you and firmly roll the bread up into a spiral.
- 7. If you have time, wrap the rolled sandwich in a piece of cling film, store in the fridge for a little while and then slice into three or four pieces or eat straight away!

Top Tip: Use brown bread and lots of veggies to make your roll-up sandwiches even healthier.

Channel Tunnel celebrates 30th year

May 4, 2024

It's the longest undersea channel in the world and today it is celebrating its 30th anniversary.

The Channel Tunnel opened in May 1994 and connects Kent, in southern England, to Calais, in northern France, underneath the sea bed of the English Channel. The 31 mile (50.5 km) journey takes just 35 minutes, a much quicker way than taking a ferry or a plane to our neighbours.

Nearly 10 million people use the 'Chunnel' every year.

Why was the Channel Tunnel created and how did it impact Europe?

Work From Engliberance began on the revolutionary tunnel in 1988 and it was opened by Queen Elizabeth II on May 6, 1994.

More than 13,000 workers from both France and England worked on the project which took six years to build.

And, it's not just one tunnel - it's actually three tunnels that run

parallel to each other. Two for trains and one service tunnel for access and ventilation.

It was built to create a cheaper and quicker alternative to travelling between England and France than by ferry or plane.

Trade between the UK and EU also benefitted from the new structure.

A very long bridge was considered as an alternative but it was decided digging a tunnel was less disruptive to the environment.



Much like in 2012 when London hosted the Olympic Games, lots of people will be travelling through the Channel Tunnel for the Olympic Games in Paris this year.

Launch to International Space Station delayed

May 7, 2024

A space flight which was due to launch from Florida in the United States was cancelled just two hours before blast off, due to safety concerns.

Two NASA astronauts were already strapped into their seats ready to head to the International Space Station, but the launch was called off after pre-flight checks showed there was a potential issue with an oxygen relief valve on the Atlas V rocket.

The astronauts, Butch Wilmore and Suni Williams, were safely removed from the Starliner capsule by a team of technicians.

A second attempt at launching the rocket is possible before the end of the week.



Astronauts Butch Wilmore and Suni Williams were ready and raring to head to the International Space Station, but will attempt to take the flight again at a later date.



The Starliner capsule sits on top of the Atlas V rocket and hoped to take two astronauts to the ISS.

The rocket, Atlas V, is manufactured by United Launch Alliance, (ULA) – a joint collaboration between private space companies Lockheed Martin and Boeing – that provides launch vehicles to NASA.

ULA has flown missions for more than twenty years, and Atlas V is America's longest-serving active rocket, but this is its first mission with astronauts.

There were no reported issues with Boeing's Starliner Spacecraft which sits on top of the rocket and the company said a launch could be attempted again no earlier than Friday.
