Coastline Paradox

hat is the total length of the coastline in Sri Lanka? If you are given a map of Sri Lanka drawn to a stated scale, will you be able to estimate the total length? Try it and see what value you come up with.

Although you expect any coastline to have a finite length, it finally depends on the method used to measure it and different methods may give conflicting

estimates. If you are measuring the length of a table, it is possible to have an accurate measure with a certain degree of uncertainty. The result will be closer to the actual length if the measuring device is more accurate. When measuring a coastline, the closer measurement may not result in an increase of accuracy.



A closer measurement increases the length and therefore it is not possible to obtain an upper bound for its length. This is because at smaller scales more details of the coastline are revealed which results in a longer measured

results in a longer measured length. This counterintuitive observation is known as

the 'coastline paradox'. The coastline paradox highlights the importance of scale in understanding natural phenomena.

The paradoxical nature of the length of a coastline was identified by Englishman Lewis Richardson in 1951. He was trying to answer a hypothesis that a length of a border shared by two countries had a bearing on the likelihood of war between them. Later, mathematicians found that the coastline paradox arises due to the fractal nature of coastlines. Fractals are mathematical objects that exhibit self-similarity at different scales.

The coastlines of Norway and New Zealand are found to be of highly fractal nature with many bays and inlets which ultimately contribute to their total lengths. The coastline of Australia has been found to be smoother giving a shorter measured length.





The scale matters when estimating the length. It has been found that the coastline of the United



Kingdom is approximately 2800 km when measured in lengths of 100 km but 3400 km when measured with 50 km measurements.

The Coast Conservation Department has stated in 2014 that the total coastline length of Sri Lanka is 1520 km excluding lagoons. In 2021, the World Factbook has recorded it as 1340 km. You can now understand why such differences occur.

The transport system of Singapore

In Sri Lanka I have seen many trains going on rails but in Singapore the trains go in covered tunnels. There are different coloured trains for different railway tracks. Inside the train is also amazingly neat and tidy. There are also many facilities for people who need extra care. There are even wheelchair and pram lockers. There are some rules that we have to follow as well. Three of them are – no smoking, no eating and also no taking 'durian' in the train!



Bus rides are also super fantastic, where we can pay through the travellers pass as well as through a bank card. There are no conductors but everything happens in an orderly manner. Many bus halts are digitalized.

I have heard that Singapore's transport system is one of the world's best.
