The environment is also protected with care. Forests are preserved, oceans are clean and animals are safe in their natural


habitats. People use technology wisely – to help solve problems like pollution and climate change, not to harm the planet or each other.



Our lovely puppies





Tokyo Sky Tree, is a broadcasting and telecommunications tower in Tokyo. At a height of 2,080 feet (634 metres), it was the world's second tallest structure, after the Burj Khalifa in Dubai, at the time of its opening on May 22, 2012.

Tokyo Sky Tree is also the world's tallest freestanding tower and it exceeds the height of Tokyo Tower, previously the city's tallest structure, by 988 feet (301 metres).



The tower has two publicly accessible observation areas, the Tembo Deck and the Tembo Gallery (or Galleria).

The three-level Tembo Deck features an observation floor that sits at a height of 1,148 feet (350 metres), above two floors of restaurants.

The Tembo Gallery has two floors, connected to each other by a winding circumferential ramp. The higher of these floors is 1,480 feet (451 metres) above the ground.

Tokyo Sky Tree was designed by the Nikken Sekkei architectural firm, and construction began in 2008.

A core column of reinforced concrete, encasing elevator shafts and an emergency staircase, is surrounded by a framework of steel tubes. At its base, the framework takes the shape of an equilateral triangle with sides of 223 feet (68 metres), but as the tower tapers, the cross section gradually becomes circular. The core column extends only to the height of 1,230 feet (375 metres) and does not support the tower. Instead, above 410 feet (125 metres) it is connected to the steel framework by flexible oil dampers that act as shock absorbers. Under earthquake conditions the core column is intended to counteract any sway of the tower.

Tokyo Sky Tree is the centrepiece of a multilevel urban development called Tokyo Sky Tree Town. The other attractions include a large shopping centre, an aquarium, a planetarium and a 31-story office building.

Meet the 13 guide dog puppies - named after treats

charity that breeds and trains guide dogs has just welcomed their largest litter in years. Biscuit, Crumble, Bagel, Crumpet,

Rye, Tiger, Pretzel, Apple, Eccles, Cocoa, Chelsea, Custard and Ginger are the new arrivals at Guide Dogs HQ in Leamington Spa.

The number 13 is known as 'a baker's dozen' and as there are 13 puppies, they've all been named after yummy treats.

Now at eight weeks old, the gang will begin their journey into becoming guide dogs to help people with sight loss.

Training guide dogs is an important, but tricky business.



Not only are the pups incredibly cute, they are also incredibly expensive.


It costs about £77,000 to breed, raise and train each guide dog. It means this baker's dozen is worth over £1 million!

Janine Dixon, from Guide Dogs UK, said the team had no idea that Yori had so many pups on the way.

The average litter for Guide Dogs UK is between seven and eight puppies, so this one is huge.

But it doesn't quite beat the charity's record, which was won by German Shepherd Unity, who had a recordbreaking 16 puppies in 2022.







New large coral reef discovered in the Mediterranean Sea

October 16, 2025

A large white coral reef containing important species and fossil traces has been found in a rare discovery.

The reef, which is at a depth of more than 500 metres, was found in Italy's Gulf of Naples, in the Mediterranean Sea.

Discovered using a remotely operated submarine the rich ecosystem is something the mission leader described

as, "rarely seen elsewhere in our Mediterranean".

Not only is the discovery rare, but it is vital learning for scientists.

What is a coral reef and why are they of interest?

Coral reefs might look like plants but coral is actually an animal!

Closely related to sea anemones and jellyfish, coral has a hard, protective limestone skeleton called a calicle, which they use to help anchor them to the sea floor.



The reef was discovered off the Gulf of Naples.

Sometimes you might hear them described as "rainforests of the sea".

They are of great interest to scientists as they are one of the richest marine ecosystems, meaning they host a lot of species - sometimes millions.

Because of this they play a big role in sustaining marine life.


